**LOCAL NEWS**

**THE SAVINGS BANK.**  
The dominion savings bank returns for the month ending May 31 are as follows: Deposits, \$64,455.62; withdrawals, \$90,996.34.

**RECEIPTS IN FINES**  
Police court and city court fines for the month just ended totalled \$898. Fines imposed under the Prohibition Act amounted to \$1,760. These figures are regarded as very high and much above the average.

**ACCIDENT**  
John Wilson of 29 High street, assistant millwright at Elevator A, was injured on Tuesday afternoon, by having the fingers of his right hand caught in a winch. The third finger was badly lacerated and the second finger was broken. The wound was dressed at the Emergency hospital and he was then able to go to his home.

**DEATH OF CHILD.**  
Friends of Mr. and Mrs. Mayes C. Smith, of 166 Adelaide street, will sympathize with them in the death of their youngest child, Roy Stewart, aged nearly one year, which occurred early morning. Besides his parents he leaves one brother. The funeral will be held from his parents' residence at 2.30 o'clock on Friday afternoon.

**NOVELTY SHOWER.**  
Friends gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Pattman, Bridge street, last night, to attend a novelty shower given in honor of Miss Mabel Drilen. Miss Drilen was the recipient of many useful and beautiful gifts. The evening was spent in music and games and dainty refreshments were served.

**MRS. BLANCHE COCHRANE.**  
The death of Mrs. Blanche Cochrane, wife of Harry C. Cochrane, occurred in St. John this morning, after an illness of only a week. Besides her husband, she leaves her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Medley Belyea, of West St. John; one sister, Miss Muriel at home; and two brothers, Charles H. and Percy F., both of West St. John. The funeral will be held from her parents' residence, 245 Charlotte street west end, on Saturday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock.

**THOSE SYDNEY BOYS.**  
The two juveniles from Sydney being held at the police station have satisfied the police as to their identity. They admitted having given assumed names, and gave as their reason that they did not wish their parents to know where they were. It was thought yesterday that they might have been concerned in a break which occurred in Sydney just prior to their departure, but it was found that such was not the case. Some disposal will be made of the case very soon.

**CUSTOMS GAIN.**  
The customs returns for the port of St. John for the month of May show a gain of only \$3,817.91 over the same month last year. The gain in revenue for the month has been much greater, but for both May, 1921, and May, 1922, the figures are very large. The figures for May, 1922—Import duty, \$688,143.84; sundries, \$890.29; excise tax, \$81,746.72; excise duty, \$6,248.50; total, \$895,989.35; May, 1921—Import duty, \$745; marine dues, \$1,107.76; total, \$872,780.10. May, 1921—Import duty, \$608,084.76; sundries, \$937.70; excise tax, \$41,722.64; excise duty, \$4,841.98; pilotage fees, \$2,478.78; steamship inspection fees, \$65; marine dues, \$701.96; total, \$718,962.19.

**PLEASED WITH APPOINTMENT.**  
Officials of the local G. W. V. A. today expressed themselves as much pleased with the word just received that Dr. J. F. Ellis of Halifax had been appointed unit medical director of the S. C. R. Halifax, succeeding Lieutenant-Colonel Joseph Hayes, who has resigned to accept another position. Dr. Ellis is regarded here as exceptionally well qualified for the post, and it is suggested that his appointment may be the first step toward the re-establishment of the office of unit medical director for New Brunswick, which the G. W. V. A. has been urging during the last few months, and to which it is understood that Dr. Ellis is very favorably inclined.

Miss Margaret O'Hara, O'Hara and Miss Catherine Coughlan, Thomas McGuire and Miss Helen McGuire; Mr. and Mrs. David Howard and Michael and Percy Howard; this city will attend the ceremony, as also will Mr. and Mrs. Leo Howard of Vancouver.

**VISITED NEWFOUNDLAND**  
F. G. J. Knowlton returned home this week after a visit to St. John's, Conception Bay and other points in Newfoundland, and to Sydney, Pictou, New Glasgow and Charlottetown. Mr. Knowlton went away on May 17, and spent five days in Newfoundland. He was greatly impressed by the wonderfully picturesque scenery of the island, and its great natural resources. He found business there not greatly different from conditions on the mainland. There is a general tendency to economize and meet the situation in a sane and courageous way. While in Charlottetown Mr. Knowlton visited the legislative building and saw in the room where the delegates to consider confederation met the bronze tablet showing in relief the features of Sir John Macdonald, Sir Leonard Tilley, Sir Charles Tupper and other members of the famous conference preceding the formation of the Dominion.

**RAY CHISHOLM AND FIFIELD IN A BOUT TONIGHT**

Halifax, N. S., June 1.—George Fifield of Toronto, American 126 pound amateur champion, and Ray Chisholm of Halifax, maritime province title holder, will stage the feature event in a boxing programme here tonight.

**BEGINNING OF NEW RELATIONS**

Halifax and St. John to March Shoulder to Shoulder—A Great Conference.

George E. Barbour, speaking for himself and his fellow Board of Trade delegates, W. F. Burditt, M. E. Agar and L. W. Simms, said to The Times this morning that words could not adequately describe the impression made upon their minds by the welcome, the sympathy and the spirit of co-operation manifested by Halifax business men and all citizens whom they met while in that city.

Mr. Barbour said that the fact that the St. John men had gone there to endeavor to get unity of effort and action between the two cities created an atmosphere so cordial as to make the visit a continuous pleasure as well as a great success from the standpoint of real co-operation. Aside from business, there was much entertainment, so spontaneous and so generally shared in by Halifax people as to impress most deeply as well as delight the visitors. Lieutenant-Governor Grant, Mayor Murphy and others in official position took special pains to extend every courtesy.

G. Fred Pearson, whose address before the St. John Board some time ago struck the keynote of maritime co-operation, gave up his whole time to the conference, and President Stairs and members of the Halifax Board of Trade displayed a spirit of comradeship which exceeded all expectations. The thing that impressed Mr. Barbour and his colleagues more than any discussion of a given subject was the manifest desire of the Halifax people to realize the spirit of unity and make it fruitful for maritime progress. The greatest thing accomplished was the profound conviction which grew throughout the conference that this was but the beginning of a new era in which Halifax and St. John would march shoulder to shoulder to achieve objects of prime importance to the development of the maritime provinces.

**TAGGERS BEING WELL RECEIVED**  
Generous Response in Funds for Hilton Belyea's Expenses Reported.

The tagging for the Hilton Belyea fund seems to have met with a generous response from the people of the city. Many of those in charge of districts sent out headquarters for extra supplies of tags. The West Side, as could be expected, turned in the most favorable reports for the morning but from all parts of the city the workers seemed to be receiving good contributions and to be optimistic and enthusiastic about the chances for raising a good sum to help defray Hilton's expenses on his Philadelphia trip and on his trip across the Atlantic, if he goes to the English Henley. The neat white and blue tag with the words, "I helped Hilton row for World's Championship, 1922," took very well with the people generally who felt that by reading this that they personally were interested in the success of the taggers' endeavors.

The tagging is under the auspices of the local council of women under the general sponsorship of Mrs. R. J. Hooper, assisted by Mrs. E. A. Young, convenor of tags, and Miss Alice K. Eatey, convenor of banks. The only change in the staff of taggers from the list published previously is for Main street from Douglas avenue to Indian street, which is in charge of the North End branch of the Catholic Women's League under the leadership of Miss M. H. McCloskey and Mrs. F. Fitzgerald. Mrs. G. Wilford Campbell, who was to have taken charge of this part of the city, is out of town and therefore unable to serve.

Very few of the banks had been turned in as noon and the counting of the money was not commenced until three o'clock this afternoon so that no estimate of the amount received could be made but those at headquarters seemed confident that a large sum would be realized.

**THE EMERGENCY HOSPITAL CLOSED**

Some 60 Cases Looked After at Sand Point in Last Season.

The Emergency hospital on the West Side which is operated during the winter port season jointly by the Canadian Pacific and the Workmen's Compensation Board, closed yesterday for the summer. The hospital was opened on November 28, and since that time sixty cases have been dealt with. Of this number only three have been serious enough to require removal to the General Public Hospital. The others were all cases of a minor nature, and after the injuries were dressed at the Emergency hospital, the patients were able to be sent home or to return to their work.

The number of cases treated was about the average for each winter since the hospital had been in operation. Dr. F. L. Kenny was the medical attendant and Mrs. V. B. Barlow was the capable nurse in charge, having held this position for the last five years. The hospital does a good work and the men working on the steamers and others speak in high terms of the treatment which they have received from the capable and obliging staff.

**SYDNEY STREET FIRE**

The chemical was called out last evening about 6.30 o'clock for a small fire in a house occupied by John East at 127 Sydney street. The fire was said to have started by the overheating of the kitchen stove. Little damage was done.

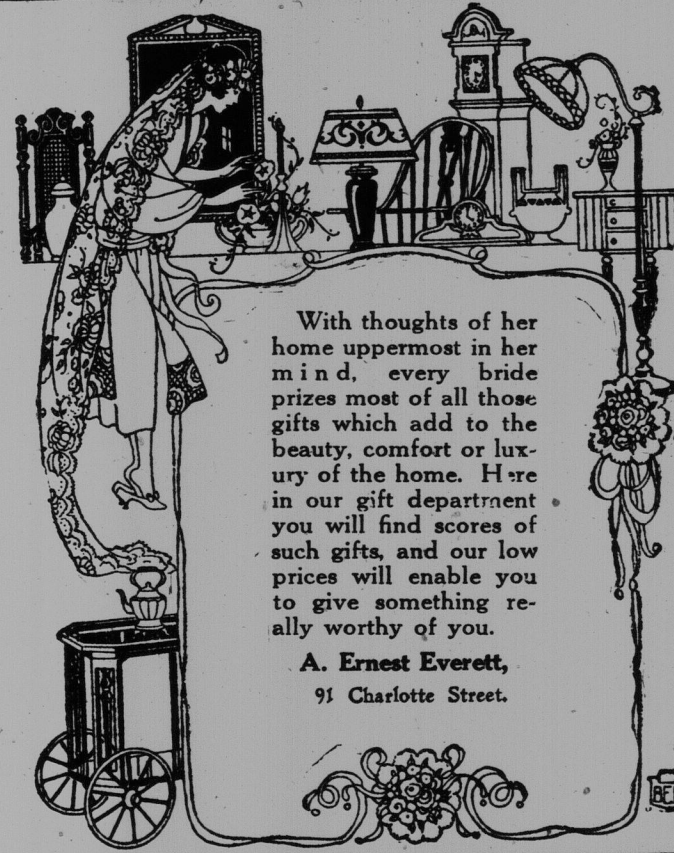
