

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The government will not redeem any cancelled luxury stamps except those entirely unused and uncanceled, according to an announcement by the inland revenue department.

The holy see office in Rome has issued a decree asking Catholic bishops to watch an organization which instills indifference and apostasy to the Catholic religion in the minds of its adherents. The decree mentions the Young Men's Christian Association by name. Officials of the association in New York have expressed resentment against the decree.

Foreign ships on which conditions were below the standard set by the United States' merchant marine would be denied entrance to United States ports under a bill introduced yesterday in the United States senate commerce committee.

A sneak thief in Atlanta, Ga., broke into a church on Wednesday night and

stole every gift off a Christmas tree which had been prepared for the children.

New money displayed on a tree in the window of a bank in Scranton, Pa., proved too much for two men, who broke the glass and entered, but were caught by the police, who were warned by the burglar alarm.

Two firemen were killed and four injured in a fire yesterday in St. John's N.B., which destroyed the Star theatre. The loss was placed at \$50,000.

The first move in the direction of a pipe line construction in and from the northern oil fields has been made by interests connected with the Imperial Oil Company, according to a despatch from Edmonton.

Dr. John L. Cope, commander of the British imperial Antarctic expedition, has sent word to London from the Falkland Islands that he was leaving there on Dec. 20 for the south pole.

The central relief station in Toronto has reported that 18,064 persons in the city have asked for charity to tide them over desperate conditions in which they

find themselves. There are now 25,000 unemployed in Montreal and arrangements have been made to put 500 of them to work on the streets.

W. C. Smith of Lunenburg, managing owner of the schooner Delawana, of international schooner race fame, died yesterday at his home at the age of 62. He collapsed during the recent race.
