


Corinthian Likely To Be Total Loss

C. P. R. Steamer Which Left St. John on Saturday Struck Ledges off Briar Island

The C. P. R. S. S. liner Corinthian, 7,882 tons gross, is ashore on the Bolton's Ledge, Briar Island, and it is feared will be a total loss. She sailed from port Saturday morning with a large cargo of grain and cased meats for Glasgow, and during the passage down the bay encountered heavy seas and fog. She struck the ledges about three o'clock Saturday afternoon. Their S. O. S. signal was picked up here and the government steamers Aberdeen and the Canadian naval ship Festubert were rushed to the scene to rescue the crew. They arrived late at night, but owing to a heavy sea running could not take off any of the men until early morning. The crew totaled eighty-seven men and all are accounted for. They are to be brought here on the rescue steamers. The Corinthian was commanded by Captain Tannock and was one of the best known ships coming to this port. She was built in 1900 at Belfast for the Allan line and was taken over a few years ago by the C. P. R. S. S. She is 466 feet long and had a gross tonnage of 7,882.

The death of Mrs. Roland Campbell occurred at her home in Salina on Monday, December 2, from influenza. She was eighteen years old.

Herbert S. Gill.



CANADIANS IN LONDON.


