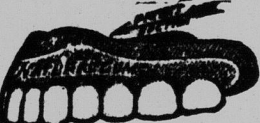

ADVANCE MADE IN WARFARE IN THE AIR

Only Six Years Since Wrights Astonished World With Flights

So much attention has been drawn to the astounding feats of skill and daring displayed by aviators within the past year that the surprising advances in aeroplane design seem to have been comparatively unnoticed by the general public. Some of these show a degree of confidence in the immediate possibilities of the art of mechanical flight that is almost incredible. The evolution of the military aeroplane, especially, appears wonderful. The new sea-plane with folding wings, intended to be carried on warships, is offset by half a dozen new types of army-planes. And that these are no mere theoretic inventions is shown by the fact that they are in actual use in the present European struggle.

Yet it is only six years since the Wrights astonished the world with their first public flights which now seem merely childish play. Although the aeroplane is the newest locomotive mechanism in existence it is already being differentiated into as great a variety of forms to suit various purposes as if it had been in familiar use for centuries. First, we have two "fighting aeroplanes," one to carry, in addition to the pilot, a gunner, and, of course, a gun, with ammunition up to 300 pounds in weight, and the other to have not only a gun but 100 pounds of bombs. The first can transport enough fuel to drive it 200 miles, and the second enough to go 800 miles. Both of them are designed to climb 3,500 feet in ten minutes, and their speed ranges from forty-five to seventy-five miles an hour.

In addition there are "reconnaissance aeroplanes," equally speedy on a horizontal course but capable of more rapid climbing, one of them being able to mount 3,500 feet in seven minutes and the other in eight minutes. The special purpose, of course, is to quickly attain an elevation sufficient to enable them to survey a vast extent of country, and detect covert movements, or concealed masses of the enemy. Both are fitted with wireless apparatus, which may weigh as much as eighty pounds, and by whose aid they can keep in constant communication with their base.

Finally there is the "light scout," a very Ariel for nimbleness and agility, capable of being started by its pilot simply by hand, having a range of speed from fifty up to eighty miles an hour, and able to climb 3,500 feet in five minutes. It carries no armament and no telegraph apparatus, but is counted upon on account of the velocity of its evolutions, to dart over an enemy, discover his secrets, and return to its base all within the space of a few minutes. It could go ten miles and return in a quarter of an hour. Its small size would render it inconspicuous at any considerable height, and it would be a chance to the pilot that could not be lost.

One has to summon up all his human sentiment in order not to feel a wish to see the wonderful spectacle that these varied types of aerial fighters hovering and swooping over a battlefield, would present.

BERLIN FEELS PINCH OF THE WAR IDLENESS
Factories Are Closing Down or Short-Handed. Trades Are Suffering

Berlin, Aug. 27—War has brought in its train widespread involuntary idleness, in spite of the millions of men withdrawn from productive employment. Factories are closing down or running short-handed, and the pinch of unemployment is felt everywhere among the working classes. Symptoms of it are seen in the numbers of workmen appearing in the streets as newshy or seeking work on unusual employment and in the heavy calls for assistance from the municipal and labor union funds.

A picture of the extent of the non-employment is given by the statistics of the Greater Berlin Employment Register. The largest labor union in the Berlin district, that of the metal workers, with 88,000 members, reports 11,000 unemployed, although some 16,000 members are with the troops in the field. Of the 52,000 members of the Truckmen & Transport Workers' Union, one-tenth are idle.

The Wood Cutters' Union reports 14,000 of its 27,000 members out of work. Of some 7,000 unorganized workmen, largely employed in the piano industry, only 140 are at work. The Bookbinders' Union has 3300 of its 8500 members to support. Other branches of industry report similar conditions.

Some trades, however, are affected in the opposite direction. Bakers and butchers are being advertised for, or many having been called into service with the troops that for a time interruption of the city's supply of bread and meat was feared. Brewers also are in demand, breweries being in full operation to supply increased demands from the cafes and restaurants, where the public gather to await the war news; and saddlers, tailors and carpenters are working overtime to supply the needs of the army.

VISITING THE EXHIBITION

Miss Synott's playing itself will be an attraction and will be appreciated as such by all who recognize good music."
