

VARYING RUMORS OF DESTINATION OF SOME OF THE CANADIAN TROOPS; WHAT LOCAL SOLDIER WRITES

Are there Canadian troops now on the firing line in France, or at least nearer the scene of action than Salisbury Plain? The question arises from a letter sent to his home in St. John by one of the local volunteers. Under an entry dated October 8 in his diary he tells of news being received of the fall of Antiwerp, and states that two of the steamers the Laurentic and Royal Edward, the latter known here from trips made last winter, received orders to cut loose immediately from the Canadian convoy and hasten full speed to France. The orders were given apparently because of the fall of Antwerp. On the steamer it is of particular interest to note were the crack corps of Canada, the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Strathcona Horse, and the Princess Patricia regiment.

It is thought possible that the statements are correct and that, owing to the severe censorship prevailing no mention was made of the orders given. But did the troops mentioned land in France?
