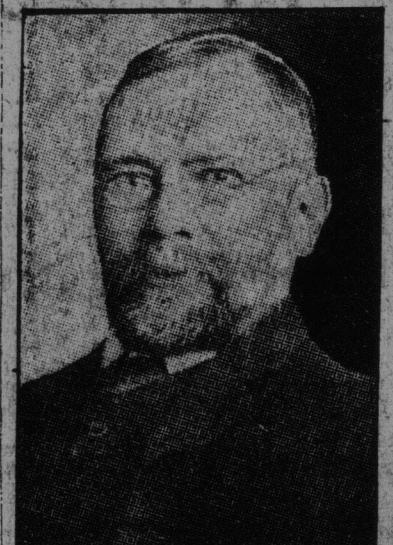

KILL FRIEND IN EFFORT TO CAPTURE GRAVE ROBBERS

Brothers Shot by Mistake Sheriff
Who Was Aiding Them—Tragedy of a Cemetery

Great Falls, Mont., May 12.—A trap laid by Harfield G. Conrad, one of the wealthiest men in the state, and his brother, in which they hoped to catch the men who last year stole the body of the former's one-year-old son from its grave in a cemetery here, resulted in the killing by the Conrads of Joseph Hamilton, ex-sheriff of Cascade county, a friend who was assisting the brothers in their plan to capture the grave robbers.

Recently Conrad was notified his child's body would be returned to him if \$1,500 was left beside a lantern he would find burning at a lonely spot on the Fort Dent road.

Making up a dummy package the Conrads proceeded to the place in an automobile. Hamilton was to follow on horseback and take the grave robbers by surprise.

Coming to a point where a light was burning some distance from the road they dropped their packages and proceeded on the way. About a mile farther on they found the lantern burning by the roadside, and realized they had made a mistake. In turning to get the package again they saw stooping over it the figure of a man who straightened up with a gun in his hand as they approached.

Both Conrads immediately opened fire, the man dropping to the ground. Investigation disclosed the fact that they had killed their friend Hamilton.

SAYS THE CHURCH IS LOSING ITS HOLD

Prof. Adam Shortt Speaks To
Ministers—Problem Becoming
More Difficult Every Year

(Ottawa Journal)

"As a teacher of social science I find no subject more interesting than that of sociology in the church," asserted Professor Adam Shortt, when he rose to deliver an address at the annual luncheon of the Ministerial Association yesterday afternoon at the Young Men's Christian Association.

"The church as a social institution," he continued, "has many opportunities. But the question as to how to make the best use of these opportunities is becoming more of a problem each day."

"The problem of dealing with the social question in the church is not one that will ever reach the stage of finality. It is an eternal problem. And this great problem is being made more difficult each year as the freedom of the individual is becoming so great that the tendency to rise or fall, accordingly, makes it harder to deal with. Parents are neglecting to look after their children more today than they did some years ago, when they should be giving them even more attention. People seem to be drawing farther away from the church, thereby making it more difficult for sociology in the church to advance itself."

"Business organizations are growing up and squeezing the church out. It is being left outside. It has no longer any commercial power to compel people to go to church. It is losing its strong hold that was at one time a prevailing feature. The great problem now is how to get back."

"One of the great problems of the church is to get to know the individual and then work accordingly, towards drawing him to the church."
