## BILLIARDS.

Would Bar All Billiards  
Columbia, S. C., March 29.—(By Canadian Press) A bill which would make the playing of any form of billiards, even in private homes, an offence against the law, has been sent to the Senate after being passed by the House of Representatives. The penalty for violating this law is set at not less than a fine of \$25 nor more than \$100, or imprisonment at hard labor for not more than thirty days. Originally the bill contained a clause only prohibiting the playing of billiards "for profit," but a vote was taken to strike out these words, so that the bill as passed read without reservation, "to prohibit the playing of billiards, pocket billiards or pool anywhere in the State of South Carolina." South Carolina is the only state that has no divorce laws.

## TURF.

The Kentucky Derby  
Louisville, Ky., March 29.—One hundred and forty-five thoroughbreds are entered for the 1923 Kentucky Derby. This is a record number for this race, and the closing event.

These equine aristocrats come from every section of the continent and include practically every winner of a big two-year-old stake last year, including the Belmont futurity, both divisions of the Pimlico futurity, Kentucky jockey club stakes, Bashford Manor stakes, Lexington futurity, the Queen City handicap, the Saratoga special and other events, according to an announcement issued by M. J. Winn, general manager of the Kentucky Jockey Club, which will stage the 49th running of the historic race at Churchill Downs, on May 19.

Indications point to a large number of starters. "With twenty-one starters the Derby this year will be worth \$64,000, to which will be added a gold sovereign for the winner valued at \$7,500." Mr. Winn's announcement read.

As has been the case for years, East will vie with West for the honor of naming the Derby winner, all the leading stables of both sections having entries. Among the eastern stables represented are those of August Belmont, Harry Payne Whitney, H. F. Smead, J. S. Cadden, Benjamin Block, Willis Sharpe Kilmer, Admiral Cary Grayson and J. K. L. Ross. Western stables include those of E. R. Bradley, John E. Madden, J. C. and G. H. Keene, and others of prominence.

# FRED S. CAMERON GOES TO COAST

Former Long Distance Runner Leaves Amherst to Locate in Vancouver—A Notable Record.

(Amherst News.)

Fred S. Cameron, long distance runner, and holder of a variety of amateur and professional distance records, will be greatly missed from Amherst. Mr. Cameron, who left Saturday night for Vancouver will take up his residence on the coast. In the past three years, since Mr. Cameron returned to Amherst, he has been an indefatigable worker in the interests of young athletes. He has acted as a volunteer trainer for A. A. A. A. sprinters and distance men. He has given hockey players pointers on training, and aided in every athletic meet.

Men of this calibre are an asset in sport and Amherst now meets with a liability. Cameron's Maritime records, both as an amateur and a professional, will long be remembered. He holds the five mile record 26.01, and then had a professional mark of 23.52, made in a five mile race with Abbie Woods. He won the Halifax Herald and Mail races, a Maritime classic, and in his second year of the running captured the Boston Marathon. During his running career Cameron defeated W. K. Sterling of St. John, Tupper MacKenzie, Springfield; James and Norman Turnbull, Springfield; Tom Longboat, Toronto; Robert Fowler, Boston; Ted Wood, London; Abbie Woods, Toronto; St. Yves, Paris; Clarence DeMar, Boston; Horne, Boston; Corkery, Hamilton. He ran one dead heat with Jole Ray, defeated the Illinois Club runner once, and also met defeat at the same man's hands. There are a score of other runners that Cameron has met.

Amherst fans will long remember the hey day of Fred Cameron's career. As a mere kid he started out in the running game in Springfield, taking a half mile, and then a quarter mile second in a quarter. A short time later he met Hans Holmer of Halifax, in a mile race in the old arena, Holmer won, but Cameron was a close second. Originally the boy contested a quarter of a lap. Next year Cameron went to Halifax where he captured the Herald distance race, and next spring journeyed to Boston, where he broke the record for the B. A. A. Marathon. For a year he met the best of the amateur talent, and then signing for fresh words to conquer, turned professional. His real debut in professional ranks was made at the Powder Hall, Marathon, Edinburgh, where he finished third. Cameron's career has been interesting. Only a few years back, when a member of the Illinois Athletic Club, he was running as an amateur, and even then was able to hold his own with the best.

# LEONARD BIDS ADIEU TO STAGE

World's Lightweight Champion Says He is Sick of the Footlights; Welcomes Training Period.

When a little clock in Benny Leonard's dressing room at the Winter Garden struck eight bells last night, meaning that midnight had rolled around again, the lightweight champion was busily engaged in removing slathers of grease paint from his slightly scarred features.

"Thank God this is over," he was heard to remark as he dabbed at the black pencilling under his eyelids. "It may have been all right for Booth and Sothorn and Hackett, and even for Harrigan and Hart, but it's no game for a boxer. I'm sick of the footlights and that's a cinch. I'd rather meet Lew Tendler every week than to be an actor for a month. Anybody who thinks this job is easy ought to step in and try it for a while."

This gentle colloquy marked the end of Benny's career as an actor. He severed diplomatic relations with the Winter Garden last night, and he will not be seen on Broadway for a long time to come. He leaves tonight for Lakewood, N. J., where he will do nothing but resting up. When he gets himself back to a state of physical normalcy once more he will engage in some light training stunts, assisted by some talent imported from Manny Seamon's gymnasium himself.

# WILSON'S MANAGER QUITS BOXING GAME

Killilea Says He is Disgusted With Way New York Commission Handles the Sport.

Boston, March 29.—Marty Killilea, who has managed Johnny Wilson, middleweight champion outside of New York State, during Wilson's ring career, has announced that he will withdraw in any direction last July, has been entirely eradicated.

Will Be Ready in May  
"By the middle of May I'll be ready to take on Tendler, White, Kansas, or any other lightweight who thinks he has a chance to grab my crown. I weigh right now more than 140 pounds but I'll have no trouble at all in making the lightweight limit of 135. The first day of real training I'll put in will take close to five pounds off. After that it will be easy keeping within striking distance of the lightweight limit."

"I have heard some talk to the effect that I have been dodging Sailor Friedman. Any time the Sailor wants to make 135 pounds I'll take him on and I'll knock him out inside of six rounds. In addition I'm ready to make a substantial bet that I do this—providing, of course, that he makes 135 pounds."

"If I beat both Tendler and White, and possibly Kansas, during the coming summer the lightweight situation will be pretty well cleaned up. I think I could retire and nobody would object."

**FINAL HALF OF WORLD'S SERIES**  
Edmonton Eskimos and Ottawa to Meet Tonight for Stanley Cup.

Vancouver, B. C., March 29.—The opening of the final half of the 1923 world's hockey series in this city tonight will bring together Edmonton Eskimos, Western Canada League champions, and the Ottawa Senators, champions of the National Hockey League, and victors in the semi-final over Vancouver, the Pacific Coast League champions. Although Ottawa is reduced through accidents to six men and no substitutes, it is generally conceded here today that the teams are evenly matched, and that either may be installed as favorites for the Stanley Cup when the final game is over.

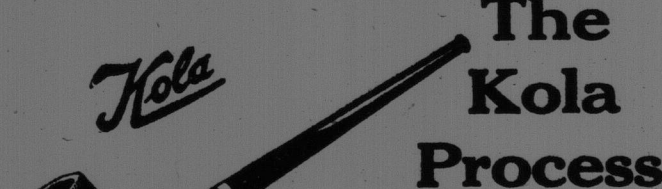
