

## FRICION IN THE NATIONS' LEAGUE

Geneva, Sept. 6.—The air was charged with electricity when the delegates to the league assembly met today. The storm centered around the Chilean delegation, a number of the leaders engaging in earnest discussion with Augustus Edwards, head of the delegation, regarding the Tacna-Arica question.

It had been reported on good authority that the Chileans would leave the assembly if this question was placed on the agenda as requested by Bolivia, for revision of the treaty of 1904. The report was persistent, despite the refusal of the delegation to confirm it, until Senator Edwards gave out a flat denial.

President Von Karmbeck proposed that, instead of discussing Tacna-Arica, the assembly complete its organization. This occupied all day.

L. Abramson, provincial pathologist, were received and showed that tests throughout August were much more satisfactory than those taken in July. The Child Welfare report from the V. O. N. was read.
