He is the Rightful Owner of the Name Being the Most Aged of all Rulers.

In connection, with the eighty-second birthday, which took place on the 24th of July, the oldest sovereign in Europe, H. R. H. the Grand Duke of Luxemburg, we publish portrait specially taken for this occasion. Among most people the be-lief has prevailed that the Queen of England or the King of Denmark is the oldest sovereign, but the Grand Duke of Luxemburg and Duke of Nassau is now 82, whilst King Christian attained his eighty-first birthday on April 8, the Queen having been 80

But, on the other hand, the Grand Duke was one of the last sovereigns to ascend the throne; in fact, when he did so, seven years ago last November, the Queen of England had reigned 55 years. However, Prince Adolph had ascended the throne of Nassau as far back as 1839, but was driven therefrom by the victorious Prussians in 1866. The then Duke of Nassau married, in 1844, Grand Duchess Elizabeth Michaelowna of Russia, who died in the following year, and, secondly, the present Grand Duchess, Princess Adelaide of Anhalt, in 1851. Of the latter marriage there are two chil-dren, the hereditary Grand Duke Wil-liam and Princess Hilda. The latter is the wife of the hereditary Grand Duke of Baden, and-childless; the former married, in 1894, Infanta Maria Anna of Braganza, and of this marriage there are three daughters. It would therefore seem that by some strange irony of fate the crown and splendid domains of Luxemburg may at some future time revert to the Dutch crown, whence they were separated on the accession of Queen Wilhelmina in 1890; for, whilst a woman may reign in Holland, she can-not do so in Luxemburg. During the seven years of the Grand Duke's reign he has done much to embellish reign he has done much to embelish his quaint capital of Luxemburg, which had been so sadly neglected by the Dutch kings; and the Luxemburgers, who have little in common with the D. h, are charmed at having their own sovereign and being an "independent nation." "independent nation.

THE HORSE COLORER.

In Race Track Parlance He is a "Ringer Preparer"

He can Take a Bay Mare Into his Barr and With 24 Hours Bring her out as White as Snow

"See that man who just went out?" asked a blacksmith, referring to a middle aged man who had left the

shop a moment before. "Well, he's the greatest horse colorer in the country and the only man who has got the business down to perfec-

"A horse colorer? What kind of a profession is that? Never heard of it

before. "Weth the business ain't generally known to the public, but nowadays the horse colorer is the whole thing in rac-ing circles. For some time there has been an opening for a clever horse colorer, and the man who just went out has made a good many thousand dollars during the past few years

working around race tracks. "Of course, you know that the outlawing rules on the race track are pretty strict, and it has become very difficult to start a 'ringer' on any track. A 'ringer,' you know, is a good horse made to appear like an old skate, so that he can be entered in the slower

races. "This professional colorer is nothing less than a 'ringer preparer,' and he's got the slickest methods you can imagine. He can take a bay mare into his barn and within 24 hours bring her out as white as snow or jet black, just as you please. The old fashioned way of coloring horses was done by a liberal use of paint, but I've known it to go pretty hard with own ers when their colored horses happen ed to be caught in a shower.

"The new method is fully known only to this one man, but he says that he uses some kind of chemicals and can give any color to any horse. He can give a black horse white feet and turn a sorrel into a dapple gray on very short notice. In another 24 hours he can bring back the original color of the horse. He charges \$25 a transformation."
