WILL GO TO OTTAWA

Members of the Council and Board of Trade Chosen.

Will Bring up Several Matlers of Import-

At informal meetings this morning at the city hall and the board of trade rooms, the names of the delegates who will leave tomorrow for Ottawa were discussed.

The delgation is slightly larger than was expected and the list of civic representatives is larger than was authorized at the last meeting of the council.

The sub-committee on the gas investigation which will be well represented on the delegation will use the opportunity to get figures and information in Montreal and other places to further their enquiry. Also the question of the drill hall will be brought up and Ald. Vanwart, who as chairman of the safety board, has been making mquiries in this regard, will put the city's side of the case before the militia department.
