Alas, the glorious days of Deyon and Cornish tin mining have long since departed! The surface veins have been worked out, and about ten years ago worked out, and about ten years ago it seemed as though West Country tin mining was a dead industry. Modern science has, however, come to the res-cue, and during the past few years a number of long-deserted mines have been reopened.
