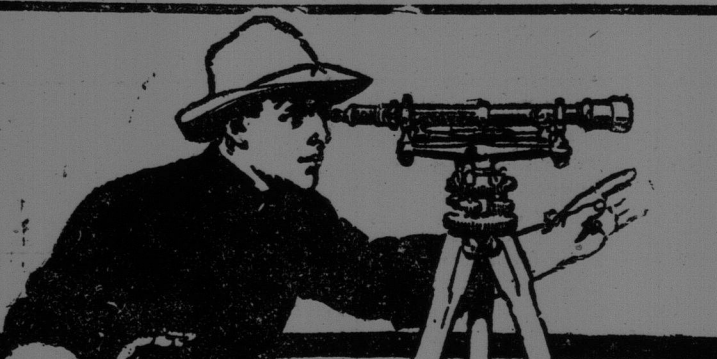

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may, pre-empt a quarter-section along his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homesteader's entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homesteader's entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

Hon. Jas. Bryce at Canadian Club Supper Discusses Unity of the Dominion and Imperial Union—Greatly Impressed With Opportunities of This Province.

An eloquent and masterly oration on "Canada and her future," was delivered before the Canadian Club by the Right Honorable James Bryce last evening. The audience that assembled at the Nickel Theatre rooms was the largest that has been present at such an affair during the life of the club.

The address was one that will be remembered for a long time. While discussing in a masterly manner the problems of Canada and the Empire, the British Ambassador held the keen interest of his hearers for about three-quarters of an hour.

At the luncheon, preceding the address, covers were laid for two hundred and seventy.

"The Nickel" cheery was present and rendered some classical selections. The Bush family were also heard in several numbers greatly to the delight of the gathering.
