AGRICULTURAL. LIME ON APPLE TREES.—An old farmer of much discrimination, observed to us recently, that he had made it a regular practice for several years to sow caustic lime around his apple trees in the spring.

On the 1st of May, I was told that a quantity of lime which had accidentally been spilled, and rendered worthless by becoming mixed with the refuse on the stable floor, had been thrown at the foot of the tree, and to this, as the principal cause, was immediately assigned the revivification and renovated fructification of the tree.
