ASSURANCE.

Some people, even Christians, who do not study the Bible, presume that Faith and Assurance are the same thing, or that they are so nearly alike, that one can hardly distinguish any difference between them. Whereas Assurance is the result of strong faith in God, and constitutes the real enjoyment of the soul. No man can have the assurance that heaven is his future home till he be an heir of God, and no man can be an heir of God till he be a son of God, and no man can be a son of God till he have repented of his sins and believed that Christ bare them away in His own body on the tree. So that there are several rungs in the ladder of Christianity. These are Repentance, Faith, Sonship, and if a man do not enjoy the assurance, that his future is all settled and secure, there must be something wrong somewhere. The salvation of God and the joy of it do not always go together, though they ought to. Salvation is a great mercy, but to so enjoy it that the heart is filled with perfect peace, this is a true indication of assurance. Faith and assurance are not always parallel lines, but they are always converging lines. For though faith and assurance do seem sometimes to stand apart, it is only for a while, as cause and effect they must ultimately be united. Job said, "I know that my Redeemer liveth," etc., but before he could say that, he had to be able to say, as he did five chapters before, "Though He slay me yet will I trust in Him." Faith is the poor trembling woman who came behind Jesus and touched the hem of His garment. Assurance is Paul saying, "Who shall lay anything to the charge of God's elect," etc.

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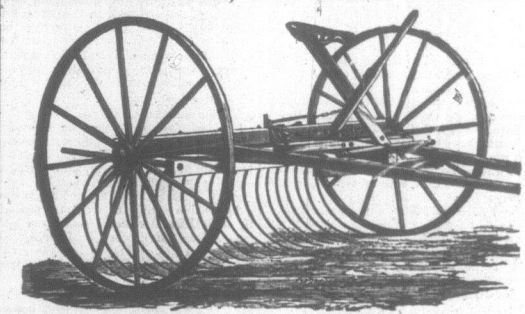
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
