IS RICKARD TO BE FROZEN OUT

Gleason and Coffroth It Is Said Will Finally Manage Jeffries-Johnson Fight--Frisco Politics To Cut a Big Figure--Rickard Replying to Gleason Says Utah Is To Have Mill.

New York, Jan. 17.—Will the Jeffries-Johnson fight be pulled off by Promoters Gleason and Rickard? Several well sporting men in the neighborhood of Forty-second street asked this question yesterday after one of the first time in three years. He's in support of this private who came word from the coast yesterday that the Frisco supervisors had granted a permit for January to the newly formed Shasta Club, which is controlled by James W. Coffroth, the promoter of the fight arena at Colma in San Mateo county, Cal. Three years ago Coffroth was barred from holding fights within the city limits by the supervisors, but the recent change of administration in Frisco has brought several of Coffroth's old friends into power. Meanwhile Coffroth's new club have decided to take no action upon Gleason's application for a permit to hold a forty-five round bout in Frisco, preferring to delay the matter for some time to come. But Gleason, it was learned yesterday, has received a quiet tip that he will get a license in due time, but must first put Rickard out of the running. In short Coffroth's pull is said to be so far reaching that Gleason will have to declare him in after freezing Rickard out before the license to hold the Jeffries-Johnson fight in Frisco will be forthcoming. Rickard, it is conceded, will not be allowed to pull off the fight in Utah, while Nevada is not seriously considered because of its proximity to California. But when Tex got a Frisco tip yesterday at Salt Lake City he gave vent to his feelings in this manner: "I will hold the fight on the desert 20 miles from nowhere before I take it to San Francisco with a local man as manager. I alone will be manager of the fight and I still plan to hold it in Salt Lake. A boxing contest is not against the Utah laws. I intend to meet a number of business men here shortly and will find out from them whether there will be any interference. The mayor of Ogden for that matter, will not oppose the big match if it is called a 'boxing contest.' Gleason can't hog it all and Frisco has no sure thing."

Another man, who was a more successful quarter miler both as a collegian and club athlete, never himself up for the start of his career by swearing profusely at himself. He had the idea that if he got thoroughly angry at himself and swore at him, it would take his mind off the race, that was about to start.

Consequently the men who were on the marks next to him on either side were likely to hear some half muttered curses and profane words that they might think were meant for them. In fact, this athlete had to explain more than once after a race that he wasn't saying anything about any one but just to himself.

It is very often the man who hasn't true courage who adopts these devices for heartening himself up artificially. However, there have been men whose nerve was unquestioned who resorted to devices to work off what they called hoodoo, and to stimulate themselves, artificially for their competitors.

Such, for instance, was one great high jumper, who used deliberately to practise before the competition actually began by knocking the bar off at all sorts of minor heights. He had an idea that by doing this beforehand, he got it all out of his system, so to speak, and he entered his competition with the assured feeling that he was not going to slip up on any poor performance.

The blind reliance of the novice on externals as the causes for good performances by the crackjacks occasionally has some odd consequences. There was a quarter mile runner who was accustomed to hold his index and second fingers pointed down as he strode along; and immediately after this was observed by several new men at the game they all began holding their fingers so as they ran.

There was another man, a distance runner, who strained his left leg and as a result favored it slightly as he ran for a time until the strain passed away. There sprang up a host of timers who thought that was the way to attain prominence in distance running. Then again a British runner who came over here about ten years ago had a fashion of working his arms like a sprinter, although he ran long distances. Almost immediately after his first public appearance a great crowd of young athletes adopted that method. They were surprised to find that it didn't make them run as fast as the Britisher.
