NOTICE TO MARINERS

Lightship Halifax has been placed in position on Sambro Bank, replacing Sambro gas and whistling buoy.

She will show an occulting white light from each masthead, showing bright eight seconds and eclipse four seconds.

The fog alarm consists of a diaphone giving three blasts of four seconds each, with intervals of three seconds between each minute.

The lightship is fitted with submarine bells which during thick weather will strike No. 14 every 21 seconds as follows:

One stroke, then five seconds' interval, then four strokes at intervals of two seconds; then an interval of ten seconds.

## LOCAL.

## A Social Evening.

## Property Sales Reported.

J. A. Likely has purchased the property at the head of Chipman Hill, owned by the Misses Potherby. It is understood that the price is in the vicinity of \$10,000. It is also reported that J. M. Donovan has had an offer of \$55,000 for his farm of 225 acres on the Marsh Road.

## Prices Advanced.

All Ontario flours have advanced 15 cents per bbl. on the local market. The movement is in sympathy with the advance in the price of wheat. Oatmeal has also gone up 15 cents per bbl. Beans advanced in the primary market 7 1/2 cents per bush, but the advance has not affected the local market yet.

## Wedded in Fredericton.

Fredericton, Jan. 31.—In St. Dunstan's church this morning, Arthur Hanlon was united in marriage to Miss Clara Ryan. Rev. F. L. Carney performed the ceremony.

## Valley Railway Contract Awarded.

Fredericton, Jan. 31.—The St. John and Quebec Railway Company has closed a contract with W. J. Scott, of Fredericton and G. F. Burt, of Hartland for the supply of ties and telegraph poles necessary for the railway between Centerville, Carleton county, and Gagetown, Queens county. The contract will require about 340,000 ties.

## Sir Thomas Tait Buys Coal Areas.

Fredericton, Jan. 31.—Sir Thomas Tait has purchased the Michael Conkley property at Minto. The property which is rich in coal, embraces about 11 acres, and is valued at \$10,000. The output of the property has been about 85 tons per day, but this can be greatly increased by the installation of modern machinery. It is said that Sir Thomas is also negotiating for the Jerome Conkley property, adjoining which consists of about 50 acres. The price of this property is \$15,000.

## GENERAL.

## Manitoba Orangemen to Fight.

Winnipeg, Jan. 28.—That 1100 Orangemen from Ulster, living in the Canadian northwest have volunteered to return to Ireland to take up arms against home rule was reported to the secret meeting of Orangemen in Winnipeg last night.

## Calamity in the West.

Winnipeg, Jan. 31.—Wet grain in the west is reported to place the people in a serious condition. Hundreds of thousands of bushels have been exposed to the weather for want of storage facilities, and there is likely to be much damage.

## Not the Slightest Truth in It.

Ottawa, Jan. 31.—It can be stated on the best of authority that Premier Borden has conveyed no intimation to the United States government that Canada is willing to again take up reciprocity negotiations upon more restricted lines than those of the Field-Knox agreement. In fact the government is not willing to negotiate with the United States, at present on any tariff question. They hold that the verdict of the people on Sept. 21 was that there should be such relations with the United States.
