

MONSTER BEAR SAID

500 Pound Animal Took Four Bullets Before it Died - Was Raising Apple Orchard.

Glenwood, Victoria County, was the scene of a short but interesting battle between a farmer named Short and a giant bear weighing over five hundred pounds on Saturday morning, when Mr. Short discovered the animal peacefully raiding his apple orchard. The bear, which from its size and ferocity was evidently an old one, took four rifle bullets before giving up. For some time past the farmers in the immediate vicinity of Glenwood have been losing sheep, lambs and pigs as the result of the monster's activities and an expedition was practically arranged to hunt him down. Last Saturday, however, as Mr. Short with the memory of a raided pig pen with the resulting financial loss still before him went out to do his early morning chores he discovered the animal in the orchard. Rushing back to the house, Mr. Short secured his rifle, a thirty, thirty Winchester and creeping up to within twenty-five yards, took aim and fired. The first bullet took effect in the bear's fore paw, the second finding the same mark. The animal, maddened by the bullets made a furious charge but two more bullets placed, one in the shoulder and another in the back, dropped him before he reached his intended victim. Mr. Short is being congratulated by his neighbors not only for his killing of the community of a dangerous pest but for his success in dropping the animal thereby saving his life. The animal which weighs five hundred pounds, is one of the largest killed in New Brunswick for some years and is now on exhibition in Vanwart's grocery store.

FERTHILL CEMETERY COMPANY IN SESSION

Many Improvements Reported by Committee—Old Receiving Tomb Torn Down.

The Fernhill Cemetery Co. met in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon, Judge Forbes presiding for the first time since his trip abroad. Several matters of interest were taken up. It was reported that lot markers had been purchased with which to mark boundaries, and perpetual care lots. The perpetual care lots are identified by a star inset in the markers. This, it is said, will prove of great assistance to the workmen employed in the cemetery. A hydrant has been installed on Water avenue to be used to water the lots in the dry season and also to protect the superintendent's residence in case of fire. The committee instructed the superintendent to retain men to complete the new lots on South avenue, Coronation Path and Elm avenue this fall so that they will be ready by next spring. It was reported that the old receiving tomb had been torn down and the stone used in building several avenues. A committee was appointed to look into the matter of purchasing a steam drill to facilitate the removing of rock from the lots. It has been found that the old method is too slow. The company received a number of lots for perpetual care. The funds derived from this have been invested in standard securities.

IS SHOT TO DEATH

BY BABY DAUGHTER

Harvey McDowell, of London, Ontario, Victim of Unfortunate Affair—Left Loaded Revolver on Table

London, Ont., Oct. 12.—Harvey McDowell, a farmer near Westfield, Ont., aged 35, died at six o'clock this morning from a pistol wound received on Sunday morning from a revolver in the hands of his little daughter. McDowell had been out Saturday on acoon hunt with a number of friends and upon returning had left the weapon on a table looking down stairs he was met by his daughter with the revolver in her hand. Pointing it at her father she laughingly ordered him to throw up his hands and then pulled the trigger. The bullet entered McDowell's head. Medical aid was secured at once but McDowell gradually weakened and succumbed this morning.

POSTPONE HEARING OF

UNION DYNAMITER

Harry W. Jones, Secretary of Iron Workers, Expected to Repeat Confession before Grand Jury.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 13.—The hearing of Harry W. Jones, secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, before United States Commissioner Young, was postponed today until November 5th. His bond of \$10,000 was continued. The charge against Jones is conspiracy to transport explosives illegally. Jones was taken in custody here following the arrest and confession of Geo. Davis alias Geo. O'Donnell, an iron worker in New York. Davis was brought to this city and it is expected will repeat his confession before the United States grand jury, which convenes here November 11.

OBITUARY.

CAPT. FRANK G. GOUGH.

In the General Public Hospital on Sunday afternoon the death of the well known and highly respected sea captain took place in the decease of Capt. Frank G. Gough. Capt. Gough, who died of dropsy, was 61 years of age, having been stricken with the disease in Boston, where he left his vessel, the schooner Helen G. King, which he had sailed out of this port to Boston and New York for Messrs. Stetson, Cutler & Co., the owners. Capt. Gough is survived by his wife in this city, and by two daughters, of Albert County, and Mrs. Annie Osborne, widow of Joseph Osborne, who died at sea on Friday evening, 10th inst., after a severe illness, in the 77th year of her age, leaving four sons and two daughters, several grand children and three great grandchildren. The sons are James Crawford and George of Parrabrook, N. S. The daughters are Mrs. Samuel Merin, of St. Martins, and Mrs. James O. Forsyth, of this city. Two of his grand children are sons of C. W. Waldron, of the I. C. R.; the third is a daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Jenkins, of Hampstead, Queen's county. She was of quiet and kind disposition and was always very attentive to her household duties and belonged to the hosts of friends; the esteem in which she was held was made manifest by the large concourse of friends and neighbors from the village and outlying country who assembled at her late home on Sunday to show their last tribute of respect by following her body to its last resting place in Mosher's cemetery. Many regrets for the bereaved family in their affliction were heard.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 400 acres can be leased to one applicant. PLACER MINING CLAIMS are 100 feet long and 100 feet wide. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development work each year. DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of the six rivers in each district for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$100 per year. Royalty, 10 per cent after the output exceeds 100,000 bushels per year.
