on the acknowledgement of the power of the law, succeeded in avoiding collision with every section of the community, and in winning for yourself the respect and esteem of all.

You have also by your kind and generous care
of the weak and distressed, gained the gratitude and
affection of many, and by your painstaking in instruction and example, you have done much to raise the
people morally, intellectually, and physically.

The Provincial Government may well be congratulated on having secured your services, for I am confident as long as you remain in the district its peace and prosperity are secured.

While we regret more than words can tell, the loss of your friendship and services, we are consoled by the thought, that it is only temporary, and that the change of air, etc., will greatly benefit your health, which we fear as been below par for some time.

Mrs. Field joins me in wishing you a very plesant journey and in assuring you of a most hearty welcome when you return, which we trust will be soon.
