

FOUR DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE!

ARRIVAL OF THE CANADIAN.

The steamship *Canadian*, Capt. Ballantyne, arrived this morning at half-past five, with four days' late news from Europe. She has a large number of passengers.

In the House of Commons Mr. Moore's motion, concerning the Ministry in the American Enlistment question, was rejected by a majority of 194.

The steamship *Indian* arrived at Liverpool on the 7th inst., at 10.30.

The *Canada* met the *Argo* on the 10th, in lat. 53, 12; long 42, 25. English Wheat, 3d 4 1/2.

LIVERPOOL MARKETS.

Liverpool, Tuesday Evening. We must expect the grain markets of the United Kingdom to be mainly influenced by the weather for at least two months, and as a very important change in the character of the season has now taken place the effect had been to produce caution in the proceedings of buyers, and a check to further advances.

The Continental Markets, from the scarcity of present stocks remain on the whole well sustained; notwithstanding the return of more favorable weather.

We have to note a return of 2d a 3d per bushel on all descriptions of Wheat since this day week, with more inclination on the part of holders to sell.

Indian Corn—Sales limited. Prices receded 2s. all round. Consols closed 95 1/2 a 95 3/4.

ADDITIONAL BY THE NIAGARA.

GREAT BRITAIN.

It is believed that Parliament will be prorogued on the 31st inst., and that no further party motions will be made this session.

The following is the only reference which has been made to America, since the sailing of the steamship *Fulton*.

Mr. Baillie asked Lord Palmerston whether Mr. Dallas, as United States representative to Her Majesty's government, had full powers to settle the Central American dispute, or whether he had any other powers than those of his predecessor Mr. Buchanan.

Lord Palmerston said it was understood that Mr. Dallas had full power to discuss with Her Majesty's government the Central American question. Mr. Buchanan had no instructions whatever to enter on this subject.

A bill has been introduced by the Government into the House of Commons to permit distillation from rice.

The Sunday music controversy continued to expand.

Sir Colin Campbell had been entertained by the city of Glasgow.

The King of Belgium and family were visiting Queen Victoria.

The Queen and the people of London are to give the Guards from the Crimea a public reception.

Dyke Sombre's celebrated will in favor of the East India Company has been set aside, and his immense fortune goes to his widow.

The prospectus of the New Brunswick and Canada Railway and Land Company to purchase and complete the St. Andrews and Quebec Railroad, has been issued.

It was reported that Percy Doyle, British Minister at Mexico, will be removed to Havana.

Professor Mahan the gentleman refused admittance of the Queen's levee, writes to the papers that he took every precaution respecting his costume.

The Directors of the Bank of England, at their weekly meeting on Thursday, the 3d instant, did not alter the rate of discount. The general impression has been that the rate would be lowered.

It was thought that they would be reduced on the following Thursday, or not later than the week after. The directors, however, do not generally like to lower it in dividend week. The bank returns show a considerable increase in bullion.

The Indian mail takes out an unusually large amount of silver for the East, and the shipments of gold to the Continent increase, with augmented inquiry for export. There is also further reason for shipment, in the shape of investment in France securities on account of England.

The weather continues magnificent for the harvest, and another fortnight of the same would secure the farmers from all danger of a change in their prospects.

There has been an increased demand for American securities since the political aspect of affairs between England and the United States had changed.

Tonnage was in better demand for the Archangel, Australian, Indian and the Danube and Black Sea trades.

The potato crop will fall short, in consequence of the heavy rains.

The Earl of Shaftesbury, appointed Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and will be raised to the peerage by his present title. Sir W. Williams, of Kars, will succeed him as representative in Parliament of Calpe.

FRANCE.

Reports have been for some time current that unpleasantness existed between the courts of France and Russia, and that Count Morny's departure for St. Petersburg was delayed in consequence. As Morny was about ready to embark the difference is probably at an end.

The report of the Committee of the Corps Legislatif refusing to accord to the Emperor the power of granting pensions, is published. It is respectful, but firm, and is considered the severest check Napoleon has yet met from his government.

The bill granting pensions to the Orleans princesses was voted unanimously, although Count Montalembert wrote a strong letter against it, and the Duchess of Saxe Coburg indignantly refused the money. The juvenile Count of Paris has written a letter to M. Roger, repudiating the union, and saying that himself, his mother and brother do not recognize the interference of the other members of the Orleans family, and that he reserves himself, for the future. The letter has made considerable sensation in the Orleans circles, and the Orleans princesses have written angry letters respecting the juvenile's interference.

At the close of the Legislative session on the 2d instant it was announced that the bill for the repeal of prohibitory customs duties is deferred until the next session.

The measure for consolidating decrees relative to customs duties into laws is also postponed.

The Emperor has arrived at Plombières.

The projected meeting between the Emperor of Austria and France is confirmed. The Frankfurt Journal says positively that the meeting will take place at Mannheim about the 10th inst.

The Emperor of France will reside at the Ducal Palace, and the Emperor of Austria at the Hotel d'Europe. The Kings of Wurttemberg and Saxony and the Duke of Baden and Nassau will also attend.

Another account says that they will at the Castle of Asenaberg.

New stocks for a steam navy are built at Bremen.

Accounts of the weather and the throughout the country, even in the inundated districts, are favorable. The vineyards also look well.

SPAIN.

The papers give accounts of the riots at Badajoz, Valladolid and other. They seem to have been of serious nature and of an insurrectionary character.

The price of food was the ostensible cause of the riots but the people really were of political enemies. Numerous were made and many of the prisoners. The rioters set fire to the corn stores, the growing crops. Tranquillity was restored, when the government announced that the crops presented a good prospect that there was ample supply in store, a harvest set in. The exports of breadstuffs were prohibited.

It was announced that a second set of ships of war, with troops for disembarkation in Mexico, was ready to sail from Mexico to Mexico to satisfy the demand.

The Cortes was prorogued on the 1st inst.

GERMANY.

The ministerial journal, the *Zeit*, put the question of the proposed law, which would be admitted at a duty of half penny per Prussian bushel of rye, barley, oats and buckwheat at 3 and 6d.

A general meeting of tobacco manufacturers on parts of the Zollverein assembled at Hanover. The object of the conference was to ward off the increased import of tobacco from the Zollverein, when it shall attain the price of two and a half to four dollars the bushel.

ITALY.

DENMARK.

Sweden has officially confirmed the law that she adheres to the declaration of war laid down by the Congress of Paris.

RUSSIA.

An imperial ukase orders the issue of millions of silver roubles.

The Emperor continues his severity against defaulters and contrabandists. Letters that the government seems inclined to its customs tariff, particularly as regards raw produce exported by foreign manufacturers.

THE EAST.

Letters from the Crimea to June 4, nothing but the continued embarkation of troops. General Ruder was dead.

The Moldo Wallachian Commission vacates but slowly, topographical difficulties completely neutralizing the intention of treaty. All Pasha during his stay at V. succeeded in settling that the Danubian principalities should remain separated.

THE CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.

Cape of Good Hope advances to April bring unfavorable accounts respecting tranquility of the frontier. Another C. war seemed imminent.

NEW ZEALAND.

New Zealand dates to May 3 had been received by the ship London, and the new elements were progressing favorably.

COMMERCIAL INTELLIGENCE.

The London Money Market had no gone low. Consols for money at 95 1/2 to 95 3/4, ex dividend. The bullion of the Bank of England had increased £2,000,000.

LIVERPOOL COTTON MARKET.

The Broker's Circular reports that the prices from New York by the Niagara, on 29th June, had a favorable influence upon Cotton Market, and prices advanced from 16th to 20th inst.—the greatest advance being to the lower quantities.

The price of cotton was 82,000 bales, which speculators took 15,000 and export 13,000. The whole stock of cotton in Liverpool was estimated at 699,000 bales, of which 2,000 tons by speculators and export.

The following are the authorized quotations: New Orleans fair, 7 1/2; middling, 6 1/2; Mobile fair, 6 1/2; middling, 6 1/2; uplands, 6 1/2; middling, 6 1/2; ordinary to good, 5 1/2. The market closed quiet.
