Business of Town Council

Middleton, Oct. 6-1924

Regular meeting of the Town Council met at 7.30, Present Mayor Sponagle Coun. G. N. Reagh, Coldwell, Solicitor Davidson.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved, moved by Coun. Reagh we proceed to the new order of business.

The Mayor stated that in discussing the matter of the constructing the new Electric Light Plant with Mr. Wright it was almost impossible to proceed with this under the condition of the old time and as Mr. Wright was present the matter was referred to him. He stated that he thought they could get a dynamo from Hansport and that Mr. C. S. Rogers would run this at \$25.00 per day, and thought this would be the best arrangement as he could not see where it would cost over \$500.

Moved by Mr. Cox that the electric light be authorized to make temporary arrangements for lights during the ten days shut down.

Mr. McDougall submitted a plan for covering the present bridge with concrete making this a permanent structure. On motion the meeting adjourned to meet at 7.30 on Tuesday evening.

October 7th:

Adjourned meeting met at 8.15 p. m. Present Mayor Sponagle, Coun. Cillors Freeman, Caldwell and Reagh. Mr. N. W. Baker asked through the Clerk to be relieved of the duties of Assessor as he had extra work. On motion Mr. John Hawkins was appointed in his stead.

Mr. Turner, Chairman of the Hospital Board being present, stated he was asked to meet the Council, requesting that the guarantee on over draft in the bank of \$1000. The question was fully gone into, but as the Solicitor was not present, the matter was left over until some future meeting.

Councillor Freeman in the absence of Councillor Power read the the Financial Statement as follows:

Streets \$173.70.
Fire Service \$3.00.
Public Property \$10.00.
Water Main \$1.75.
Police and Temperance \$33.60.
Salary and Office \$44.24.
Electric Light Cons. \$1338.62.
Wiring \$216.88.

On motion these were ordered paid.

Councillor Coldwell reported in writing. On motion this was placed on file.

Councillor Reagh reported that he had used up about all his estimate for the streets.

Mayor Sponagle asked what had been done re Mrs. Beth Langille, who was sick for some time at the hospital, but the Clerk had nothing on file.

Councillor Freeman reporting for Electric Light stated that the Committee was likely to over run the amount of money voted by possibly \$2000. Re the plans submitted by Mr. McDougall for covering the bridge estimated at \$455.00. After some discussion it was moved and passed that this be left with the Electric Light Committee to use their best judgment.

Moved, seconded and passed that the street Committee and Solicitor define School Street, bringing proper resolution to the Council at the next meeting.

Meeting then adjourned.
