Despite all the efforts of the driver and conductor the horses continued their backward career, and horses continued their backward career, and rounded the southwestern side of the bridge down to the edge of the Grand Canal.

The unfortunate occupants, upon becoming aware of their perilous position, were seen to look with ghastliness in their faces as for the last time they stared through the precipitated, pent up in their narrow space, into the water and in a few minutes they were no more. Omnibus, horses, and driver had fallen with a fearful splash into the narrow basin, and sunk to the bottom.
