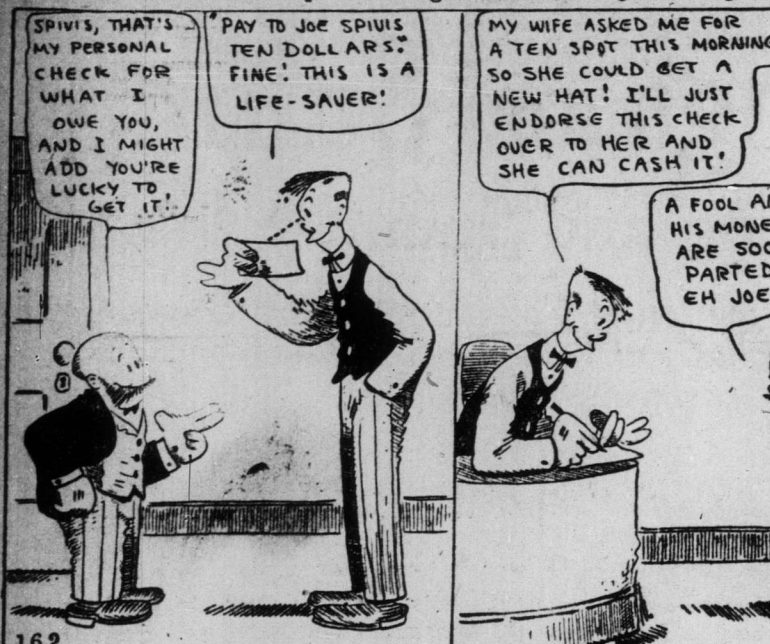

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Baitin' the Umps Was Cheap in These Days

Before the Civil War the price for sassing an umpire was one thin dime. Just glimpse this list of financial penalties listed in the constitution and bylaws with rules and regulations of the Putnam Baseball Club of Brooklyn, published in 1857 by Baker & Godwin, book and job printers, Nassau and Spruce streets, New York:

- 1—For using improper or profane language at any meeting or during the progress of any game\$0.10
- 2—For wearing or using the apparel of fellow members without his permission1.00
- 3—For disputing the decision of an umpire during field exercise10
- 4—For audibly expressing his opinion on a doubtful play before the decision of an umpire is given, except when called upon by him to do so10
- 5—For refusing to obey his captain in the exercise of his lawful authority10
- 6—For leaving a meeting when assembled for business or exercise without permission from the presiding officer.25
