left that place, and that the foreign Consuls there will follow immediately. Madrid, Jan. 12.—A despatch to El Liberal from Tangier, Morocco, says:—Official reports from Fez declare the Sultan has re-arrested his brother Mulai Mohammed.

Tangier, Morocco, Jan. 12.—The departure of five woman missionaries, four of whom are English and one American, from Fez, Jan. 8, for Tangier, had long been meditated, and was not an outcome of new developments. Many sensational reports are current here of affairs in Fez, but there is little reliable news to e had. It is considered a satisfactory feature, however, that the tribes to the south of Fez are remaining quiet. Seven Jews have been murdered in the Haina region. The Sultan is reported to be suspictous of the movements of his brother Mulaj Mohammed. His Majesty keeps the loyal horsemen from the south around his person, instead of sending them against the rebels. around his person, instead of sending them against the rebels.

IRISH LAND QUESTIONS.

They now see that the representatives of the tenants are more than willing to go half way in the endeavor to bring about permanent peace in agrarian Ireland. The rental to be dealt with is just over £5,000,000, and the amount the Imperial Govern and the amount the Imperial Govern-ment would have to pay for the solu-tion of the great problem would be about £600,000 a year. Chief Secretary Wyndham is anxious

to make the most of the opportunity, and it is be eved, indeed, that Premier Balfour and a majority of the Cabinet agree with the Kinz, that a great effort should now be made to settle the whole question. What is feared is that the Treasury may face the situation in the haggling spirit, which it seems al-ways to apply to Ireland. CHINA'S PROPOSAL.

The Powers Have Not Yet Agreed Upon a Reply.

London, Jan. 12.-Negotiations between the powers regarding the method eding. Washington's acceptance of the Chinese proposal to pay in silver does not meet with the cordial approval of Europe. A Foreign Office official said to a representative of the Associater Press to-day-

"America and England both have America and England both have been peculiarly generous to China, but this last step meets with considerable opposition in various quarters. We are willing to do everything in our power, but the situation is very complicated. The Chinese say if they have to pay in gold it will mean their country's ruin. The Delaware & Hudson Co. Gives Evidence.

tatives of the Delaware & Hudson Company, the first coal company to present its side of the controversy with the anthracite mine workers to the strike commission, occupied both sessions Satappeared before the arbitrators on be half of the company. They were James H. Torrey of Scranton, the company's principal counsel; Charles C. Rose of Scranton, Superintendent of the mining department of the company, and Abel I. Culver of New York, comptroller of the company. When Mr. Culver took the witness stand he first presented copies of the pay rolls of the company. One of the wage statements furnished to the commission showed the percentage of men receiving certain wages. The statement showed that 6 per cent. of the company's men were receiving over \$1,000 a year, 3 per cent. \$900 to \$1,000, 6 per cent. \$500 to \$900, 6 per cent. \$700 to \$800, 13 per cent. \$600 to \$700, 12 per cent. \$500 to \$600, 10 per cent. \$400 to \$500, 9 per cent. \$300 to \$400, 9 per cent. \$500 to \$300, and 25 per cent. received under \$200. The commission requested the information in this form, and it was furnished, but Mr. Culver protested that it was not fair unless a statement accompanied it showing how many days the men worked. For instance, those who earned under \$200 a year worked on an average estimate at Scranton, Superintendent of the mining statement accompanied it showing how many days the men worked. For instance, those who earned under \$200 a year worked on an average estimate at about half the month during the entire year. In addition to the wage statements Mr. Culver presented a mass of other statistics showing the number of chouses the company owned, and the rents received, and showing the dockage for the year, which amounted to 34.10 per cent. Mr. Culver disputed the accuracy of Mr. Mitchell's statement of wages paid to anthracite mine workers and those paid to the same class of workmen in the soft coalfields. This statement was handed to the commission at Scranton, and showed the bituminous men received more pry than the anthracite workers. The witness said the company is making a determined effort to lessen child labor, and that the 20 per cent. reduction in hours of labor each day, without a decrease in wages, is tantamount to a 25 per cent. increake in wages. This concluded Mr. Culver's examination, and Mr. Terry then read the laws of several States on the question of child labor. He said the coal companies would gladly join with anyone in having laws enacted forbidding the employment of children in and about anthraotte or soft coal mines under the age of sixteen years.

HELD G.T.R. FESPONSIBLE.

inquest Into the Death of Frank Norris at Port Credit.

Port Credit, Jan. 12.—Coroner Lutton held an inquest here Saturday into the death of John Norris there on Wednesday by a C. P. R. train striking an oil tank on which he was driving across the track. The jury's verdict was that the signals given by the train were not a proper protection for this crossing, and they held the Grand Trunk Railway responsible, as the C. P. R. runs over their tracks at

this point.

Engineer Plaxton, fireman Hyland and station agent Beitz all said that the proper signals had been given. Other witnesses said that the crossing was a withesees said that the crossing was a langerous one, but that a train a quarter of a mile away could be seen by a person standing 100 yards from the cack. J. J. Stewart said that the G. I. R. had promised something in the shape of an electric bell, and that the Council had asked for gates and a watchman, but had been unwilling to bear a proportion of the cost. Other testimony showed that a hood or cover on the tank might have prevented Norris from seeing the train.

Balensi came to New York seven years ago, after the failure of the Societie Fran-cais de Banque, of which he was Man-aging Director, and the funds of which he is charged with having appropriated. Later he was convicted of grand larceny and sent to Sing Sing.
