## Draft paragraphs re SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

## War situation when Parliament met, and war developments during session:

The present session opened under the shadows of the rapid and farefining successes of Japanese aggression in the Far East, and with Germany maintaining her conquests in Europe and in Africa and holding her gains of previous years. The forces of ruthless tyrannies were combined in one mighty effort to effect world domination. Japan and Germany, in making war upon the United States, had completed the circle of worldwide conflict.

Viewed from the other side, the entry of the United States into the war had served mightily to strengthen the forces of freedom. These forces had been further consolidated by the signature of the past which bound together the United Nations.

Japanese advances toward India, Australia and China, the shadows for many months seemed to lengthen. The shadows deepened as well As impatient demands for a second front in Europe threatened to strain relations between the allied powers, themselves. In the late Auctual the midwaummer, the midnight hour seemed to have arrived.

Then came two events which it now appears may have changed the whole course of the war:
