

Q. What do these Indians make their living by?

A. Fishing, logging and trapping?

Q. Do you do much logging?

A. Sometimes we do some cutting of logs.

Q. Do all the male Indians cut logs, or just a few of them?

A. Quite a few of them.

Q. Where do you sell your booms?

A. We used to sell them at Swanson Bay and Georgetown.

Q. Where do you sell them now that Swanson Bay is closed down?

A. At Georgetown.

Mr. JOHNNIE PAULL was then sworn and examined by Mr. Young.

Q. Are you a member of the Kitlepe band?

A. Yes.

Q. And you live at Kemano? You make your home there?

A. Yes.

Q. Now you have heard the evidence of Robert "elson, have you not?

A. Yes.

Q. Well, is what he said about the ground and the soil on these reserves right?

A. Yes, all right.

Q. You agree with what he said?

A. Yes.

Q. Do you know the population? That is, the number of men, women and children of Kitlepe Indians there are?

A. Yes, there are about 70 or 75.

Q. Did you help the Indian agent to make up the statement when he was there last time?

A. Yes.

Q. And that statement, which he made up with your help, is right?

A. Yes.

Commissioner McKenna: When did you help the Agent to make up the statement - this year or last?

A. Last summer.

Mr. Young: Are the Indians increasing or decreasing?

A. Well, more are being born than dying.

Q. Could you tell us how many young children there are?

A. I could not tell you now, straight away. I would have to make it up.
