World's Longest Tunnel.

The Simplon is the longest tunnel in the world and has been finished in the face of tremendous difficulties, most of which were entirely unexpected and many of which presented new problems for engineers, says Deshler Welch in the June Century. It extends from Brieg, in Switzerland, to Iselle, in Italy, the total length being a little over twelve and one-fourth miles—21,576 yards, in fact. In comparison with other great tunnels the following table will be interesting:

Sun Spot Heat and Vegetation.

Camille Flammarion writes on the influence of sun spots on spring vegetation. For the last twenty years he has noticed the date on which the chestnut trees in the Avenue de l'Observatoire have leaved and bloomed. From these records he shows that there is a remarkable correlation between the sun spots and vegetation, tending to show that the sun throws out more heat when the spots reach their maximum, thus confirming Abbe Moreaux's theory that the spots indicate the period of the greatest solar activity. Abbe Moreaux writes on the comparatively long duration of the next solar celipse, on August 30, which will be especially noticeable in Canada. Sun Spot Heat and Vegetation.
