

CAYUGA—NORTH & SOUTH.

The township of Cayuga was divided by Act of Parliament in 1849, into North Cayuga and South Cayuga, the dividing boundary being the Grand River. These townships have improved rapidly. In 1835, the whole contained only 296 inhabitants, and in 1852, the number had increased to 2837. The settlement of the townships commenced about the year 1832. The following were among the earliest settlers: David McClung, Edmund, Robert, and Abner DeCew, Donald Campbell, and Hiram Ferris. The land is rolling, the soil clay. The townships are well watered. Limestone, sandstone, and gypsum, are also abundant.
