Mayor's office here. He refusen to give the vame of his accomplice. The nunidipal conneils throughout the country are addressing messages of sympathy to the King, and thonsands of congratulatory telegrams are arriving at the
palace: The Royal Family are greatly touched at the expressions of loyalty. The Lapland Reindeer Yuron Relief Expedition of the Goverament reached New York on Feb. 27. The Manitobiar brings 113 immigranta, 537 reindeer, 418 reindeer sleds, 511 sets of reindeer larness, and between 3,000 and 4,000 bags of moss, for feeding the reindeer
en route. The immigrants consist of 43 Lapp, ten Finn, and 15 Norwegian reindeer herders and drivers, and their amilies, making a party of 68 men, 19 women and 26 children. Among them are six bridal couples. The expedition was at ouce loaded on special trains Governo
