The local market was dull to-day. The offerings in all lines were fairly free, but there was an utter lack of buyers. Butter opened at 20 cents, but dropped to 18c. The market was strong at 20 but there were no buyers. Eggs were scarce at 15 cents. Chickens and ducks were plentiful, but the quoted prices ruled. Vegetables were offered but no buyers. Apples and quinces were quite plentiful. The apple factories affect the supply, so that there is not so many offered as in former years. Potatoes were freely offered at 75c. a bag. Inquiries were made by shippers for car lots for eastern points. Potatoes will pay those who are holding them well this winter.

White fish were offered to-day. This is the last day of the season for white fish. The season closes Nov. 1. Mackerel Frozen white fish will soon be on the market to take the place of Erie white fish during the close season.

COURT OF REVISION.

People With Assessment Grievances Air Them—The Court's Decisions.

The civic court of revision held a busy day session yesterday. The appeal of Inez Astin and others on the Lacroix street sewer was adjourned until the 22nd inst.

R. W. Scane appealed on the Forsyth St. sewer, that he was assessed for whole lot between his property and of Ed. Taylor. On motion the court decided that Mr. Scane be assessed for 45 feet and Mr. Taylor for 48 feet the latter to be notified for the 22nd.

Geo. Witherpoon and Geo. Jamieson appealed on Forsyth St. sewer. J. B. Rankin appeared for them. They alleged they were not benefited, Wellington St. sewer being all the drainage they required. The court decided that Mr. Witherpoon be allowed a drainage of 33 feet and Mr. Jamieson 50 feet. D. McLachlan will be notified that 45 feet of the rear portion of his property will be assessed.

J. H. Turrell appealed on the St. Clair and Baldwin sewer that he should only be assessed for half the amount charged against him. Court decided to notify T. M. French that on the 22nd half the assessment would be charged to his property.

The appeals of Frank Cartier, Arthur McAuley, and M. Jones on the same sewer were enlarged to the 22nd.

A Democratic Governor and a Republican Legislature Likely in New York.

New York, Nov. 2.—The Herald publishes reports from all parts of New York state on the exciting political campaign now in progress. After a careful review of these reports the Herald says that it has no hesitation in saying that Judge Van Wyck (Democrat) now has a lead over Theodore Roosevelt (Republican) in the race for the governorship, and the legislature of the state of New York will be Republican, and that a Republican successor to Edward Murphy will be sent to the United States Senate.
