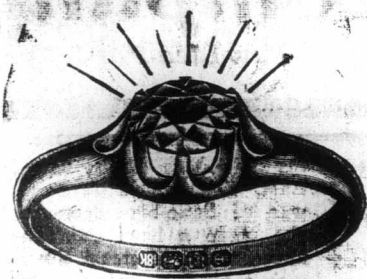

CITY NEWS ITEMS

THE PROBS

TORONTO, July 22.—Since yesterday morning a few scattered showers have occurred in Nova Scotia and the Western Provinces, but the weather throughout the Dominion has been for the most part fine and warm.

FORECASTS

Moderate to fresh southwesterly winds, fine and warm. Wednesday, southwest winds until night, then showers.

Temperature

Temperature for the last 24 hours. Highest 79, lowest 49. For the same date last year, highest 71, lowest 54.

The Brant Dragon band will furnish the music at the promenade concert which is being held in the village of Burford to-night.

A meeting of the Brantford Horticultural Society will be held in the city hall this evening.

A Money Saver.

Members of the Board of Works who inspected the excavation work on West street, this morning estimated that \$800 per day was being saved by the city.

Bought Business

Harry Fennell, who has been in the employ of J. Lewis, grocer, for the past three years, has bought out the grocery business at 104 Erie Avenue and has taken possession.

Pay Up or Be Fined.

There are about eighty citizens in the city who own dogs and have not paid taxes on their canines, and unless they pay up before Saturday they will be summoned to appear before the Police Magistrate.

They Agreed.

Yesterday AM. McFarland, Mr. Ireland of the Hydro Electric System and Mr. Frank Bishop went to St. Paul's Avenue and agreed as to the placing of the poles on the avenue. The poles will be placed on the east side of the street.

Collie Pup Killed

Ered Campbell, proprietor of the Market street restaurant, lost a valuable thoroughbred collie pup this morning. The pup was playing in the rear of his premises and ran under a wagon. One of the hind wheels of the wagon passed over its body and killed it.

Runaway on Chatham Street.

About noon to-day a team of horses, the property of the Brantford Transfer Co., hitched to a dray, became frightened on Chatham Street near Clarence St. and ran some distance. One of the horses was cut a little and slight damage was done to the dray. The driver was uninjured.

Illustrated Lecture

The regular meeting of the Wesley Epworth League was held in the church last evening. The feature of the meeting was an illustrated lecture on the Methodist mission in Japan, there being about 200 slides, and was greatly enjoyed by the large number that was present. The League are holding their annual picnic Wednesday afternoon to Moyer's Farm near Paris.

Question of Liability.

T. S. Wade, representing the Accident Guarantee Company, which protects the city, appeared at the City Council last night to state that in the case of Maggie Luckner, who was injured by a fall in front of Harp's grocery store, Dalhousie St. last winter, there was no liability on the part of the city, as gross negligence could not be shown. The case was a very unfortunate one. Miss Luckner having been in the hospital some months as a result of her injuries.

Lenten Lecture.

Rev. Mr. Annis of Victoria College, one of a band of young ministers, who are visiting various districts in Ontario in the interests of missions, gave a stereopticon lecture in Sydenham St. Methodist church last evening. There was a good attendance. The subject taken was "The Chinese Kingdom," and Mr. Annis gave a great deal of valuable information generally about the people, their customs and religions, and the great resources of the country. The object of these lectures is to stimulate missionary work and service.

The Board of Works are ready to put down a new cement sidewalk on the east side of South Market street, from Colborne street to the Victoria bridge, just as soon as they can get the poles moved to the outside of the walk.

Get Big Contract

Messrs. P. H. Secord & Sons, Ltd., of this city, have been awarded the contract for the erection of the new Merchants Bank building in Preston. The new building will be a handsome structure of stone and brick, and will cost between \$35,000 and \$40,000.

Slight Injuries

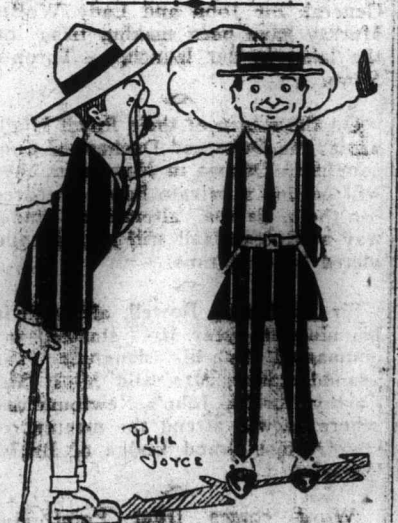
