LORD HYDE TELLS OF LIFE IN CANADA

Helped to Build the Pig Pen and Can Drive Horses Now.

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Lord Hyde, the son and heir of the Earl of Clarendon, who emigrated to Canada with his wife and family 18 months ago, is on a brief visit to England.

"I do not think I am ashamed to work," said the man who is related by birth or marriage to half the peerage, and who enjoyed the intimate friendship of King Edward and Queen Alexandra.

"I have learned since I went to Canada, the meaning of the ten-hour day, and since you ask me, I did lend a hand in building our pig-pen at Pickering, and one or two other structures."

Lady Hyde, who is helping Lord Hyde in his venture, apparently shares her husband's liking for work.

"During the first two weeks my wife did much of the 'housework,' said Lord Hyde.

"I have learned to drive a team, among other things, during my stay in Canada. We have our team horses out there now, as well as nine head of cattle and riding horses. I am returning to Canada in the New Year in order to place the farm on a paying basis. How long I shall remain will depend on circumstances.

"I want to live in Canada principally on account of my son's health but Mr. Lloyd George's methods and their outcome were partly responsible for my departure from England."

"Canada is a country with marvelous possibilities, and while my knowledge of it is confined largely to parts of Ontario and British Columbia, there is no question about the vast tracts awaiting settlement.

The scarcity of labor, especially during certain periods when the West drains off the bulk of the 'help,' is still a problem to be reckoned with, and the representations of certain real estate agents regarding the present—not the future—value of property out west have possibly caused a temporary setback. Of the future, however, there can be no doubt."

Lord Hyde was accompanied by Lady Hyde, a pretty, charmingly-dressed woman, and two children—the Hon. George Hyde Villiers and the Hon. Joan Hyde Villiers.

Advertising Now For Recruits

[Canadian Press Despatch]

LONDON, Dec. 12.—A newspaper advertising campaign for recruits to the British army is to be undertaken in all parts of the country. The War Office has become convinced of the value of the newspapers as a medium and has placed a contract with the head of a regular advertising agency to conduct the campaign during the next year on a large scale.

No less than 40,000 men are needed to fill vacancies in British regiments. The advertisement will point out that the young men who enlist will be fully clothed, housed, given \$2.50 a week pocket money, and have free medical attention, as well as receiving a pension at the age of 36 years if the recruit is not over 18 at the time of enlistment.

RECORDS BROKEN IN SIX-DAY RACE

Teams Are 37 Miles Ahead of All Old Records—The Standing.

[Canadian Press Despatch]

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—At eight o'clock to-day, at the fourth hour of the six-day bicycle race, ten teams tied for first place, the Corry-Walker team having gained a lap early to-day, which is 37 miles and four laps ahead of the record.

The Clarke-Grenda, Carman-Cameron and Mitten-Thomas combinations were still one lap behind, and the Kopsky-Keefe team were 13 1/2 miles in the rear of the leaders.

It was announced that the Anderson-Hansen team had retired from the race. They were five laps behind. They were declared officially out at 8 a.m.
