POTATO CROP HARVESTING.

It is a bad habit to leave potatoes in the ground very long after they are fit to dig. There is always the danger that a sudden frost will make the digging unpleasant and will injure the tubers. though the frost penetrate to a depth of two inches, it is enough to seridepth of two inches, it is enough to seri-ously deteriorate the money value of your potato crop. Better dig them in plenty time, and leave in piles in the field, in order to improve the quality previous to pitting or storing in the cellar. This piling in the air is necessary, because when potatoes are stored in bulk in cellar or pit, they are liable to heat because of the moisture they con Thorough drying in the field will

prevent this. It is very evident that the average value of the potato crop, at least in On-tario, will be below that of last year, and in order to realize the most we can, it is essential that the cost of harvesting be reduced. Where a large acreage is grown it is economical to use horse-power machinery. The quartette horse digger is able to dig at least one thousand bushels per day in a good yield, and fairly light soil.

It is estimated that a great many potato fields are badly overrun with weeds this year owing to the wet weather being very favorable for the propagation of all manner of weeds and grasses. These will delay the harvesting, and it is advisable that they be removed as far as possible before digging begins.

Potatoes should not be dug until the tops are dry, indicating fully ripened tubers. The soil also should be reasonably dry, except in the case of heavy loam and muck. If using the potato machine, dig every other row, thus preventing the horses from tramping on the rows as they walk. Care must be taken not to cut the potatoes, thus lowering their market value. Follow the rows and run the part of the digger fully low enough to clear the bottoms of the po tatoes

The tubers should be allowed to re main on the surface exposed to the air main on the surface exposed to the air and sun until they are dried off, and the skin somewhat toughened. Do not allow to remain too long in the sun or they will get sun burned. This injury is not

ikely to occur this year.

Potato pickers should follow the digger with a horse attached to a long nar row stoneboat using bushel baskets for holding the crop. One horse can easily pull about fifteen baskets. The sizes can

Don't sell your potatoes in mixed lots. Sell them graded and with the varieties distinct from each other. Put them into dry, cool storage, Store in open bias in frost-proof pits, basements or cellars. Last year potato yields were short in certain localities. This year the general crop is a good one, and it is likely that the price will be a little less the coming months. Save expense in barrows. coming months. Oats, good feed, rich in mineral matter, high in crude fibre, not high enough in protein to use for balancing ration, too expensive to feed at the past year's prices, good for calves, especially so if ground and hulls sifted out.

Proprietary feeds, usually variable in omposition, frequently contain weed seed and useless waste material, high in fibre and relatively expensive for the amount of energy furnished, save labor

FINDS NEW FOOD

Tuber to Take the Place of Potato In the South.

New York, Nov. 4 .- A Washington

despatch says: The Department of Agriculture has ready for distribution through Representatives in Congress one thousand bushels of seed dasheens, the semi-tropical tuber which, it is expected, will take the place of Irish potatoes in the South-ern States. This is the first season in which such a distribution will be made: The new potato substitute, which has a hairy coat and has been grown with a hairy coat and has been grown with much success in Florida, comes from Central and South America, and will grow in the moist, warm regions of the south, which are fatal to the Irish potato. It has been tried at the banquets of the National Geographic Society and pronounced decidedly good. It can be bolled or baked, or cooked in any other way a potato can be used. The taste is far more meaty than a potato. Some who have eaten the dasheen say there is a suggestion of roasted chestnut about it, and others that it tastes as though a very slight addition of gravy had been made to a potato. Tests have been shown that a crop of 400 to 450 bushels an acre can be raised.

MOVING GRAIN RAPIDLY.
