

EGG AND POULTRY TRADE.

Return of Mr. John Sanders From England.

A GOOD OUTLOOK FOR SHIPPERS.

OTTAWA, Dec. 4.—Mr. John Sanders, of Kemptville, who was sent to England a month ago to acquire into the prospective of shipping up an export trade in poultry with the mother country, returned to-day. He is joined here by Dr. Ferguson, P. of Leeds and Granville. Mr. Sanders is naturally anxious to have the result of his mission known to the public, but, as his report has not yet been sent to the Government, he was not at liberty to give any answer. He could say, however, that the actual condition of things in England was most favorable for the export of a remunerative trade with England in eggs and poultry. There is a practically inexhaustible market. All the eggs sent will be taken. The prices obtainable will also pay shipper well. The egg trade with England in the past has been very limited, but such eggs as have been exported to England have proved most acceptable to the people. Before Mr. Sanders left he sent a shipment of eggs to excellent condition, and were highly praised by Mr. Bowell, acting Minister of Finance, to-morrow, and a bulletin will be issued in a few days.

AWFUL DEATH OF A LINEMAN.

His Smoking, Burning Body Lies for Ten Minutes on the Wires.

St. Louis, Dec. 3.—Albert Julius, a lineman, was instantly killed by an electric light wire in front of No. 372 Manchester road at 10:40 a.m. Julius was at work on a pole making a connection. He is thought to have mistaken a live wire for a dead one and taken a hold of it. In a flash the electric fluid had done its deadly work. Blue flames two feet long darted from his hand. His body writhed like that of a snake. He groaned and then he fell into the network of wires below him. There the smoking, sizzling, burning body remained until the man James Boland climbed up and brought him down, fully ten minutes afterward. Julius was 23 years old, married, and had four children. He was an employe of Missouri Electric Light Company.

A GIRL BURNED TO DEATH.

Her Clothing Caught Fire and She Leaped From an Upper Window.

New York, Dec. 4.—While all the members of the family of Charles Samuel, No. 394 Bergen street, Brooklyn, accidentally set fire to her dress while raking through the rooms of the second story flat, and opening a rear window, jumped from it to the ground. The occupants of the house, who heard the girl's screams, reached the Samuel's apartments in time to see her leap. Persons in the first flat saw her descend and subdued the flames as she lay on the ground. An ambulance surgeon who was summoned found that the girl was terribly burned about the face, neck, arms and legs. She was unconscious. He hurried her to the Seney hospital, where she died soon after admission.

An Engineer Killed.

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—The switchman at the Grand Trunk station at Lachine this morning mistook the western express for the Lachine suburban train and switched it onto the wharf line. Before she was discovered the engine of the express train had jumped the wharf into the river. The cars, with the exception of the baggage car, which is hanging half by the top of the wharf and the water, remained on the track. Engineer Joseph Boise was killed. The escape of the passengers on the train was miraculous. There was a blinding snowstorm at the time of the accident, and to this fact is attributed the switchman's error in sending the train out on the wharf. The same cause prevented the engineer from discovering the wharf whereabout until too late to stop. The dead driver was a native of Scotland. He resided in this city, and leaves a wife and six children. Among the passengers were George A. Birge, Hamilton; Robert Acheson and Mrs. Acheson, Stratford; James Stoddart and Miss Stoddart, Toronto; and Mr. Leonard, Quebec.

Broke His Wife's Arm.

TORONTO, Dec. 4.—James McFarlane, who lives in the rear of the street west, went home last night the possessor of a large internal load of stimulant. He had not been long in the house when he began to experience dissatisfaction. His wife did not take his remarks meekly, and he proceeded to enforce his ideas with a chain. This was quickly broken, but the woman had not yet satisfied, McFarlane seized a stick of cordwood, and after a few strokes broke his wife's wrist. The police were notified by a neighbor, and arrested McFarlane, while the woman had to be taken to the hospital in the ambulance.

ANOTHER GREAT STORM.

Continued Reports of Wrecks on the Coast.

HALIFAX, Dec. 4.—Another tremendous storm raged along the Nova Scotia coast this morning accompanied by heavy rain. The wind blew a perfect hurricane from the south-east, and must have proved disastrous to shipping along the Atlantic coast. Telegraph lines are down along the eastern shore, and great difficulty is experienced in communicating with points in Cape Breton, where the storm raged with great fury, and where it is believed that many vessels must have been wrecked. The schooner Onward, which arrived from Boston last evening and anchored in the stream, dragged her anchor during the storm, and came into collision with another steamer. In order to save the Onward had to slip her cables. She also broke her main boom. The Onward is bound to Charlottetown, P. E. I., and put in here for shelter.

Work-House Burned.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The work-house at Newcaste-under-Lyn was destroyed by fire to-day. Six persons lost their lives in the burning building.

KINCARDINE, Dec. 4.—Government Detective Greer caused the arrest of Daniel McLeod in connection with recent barn burnings in Kincardine township. The magistrates discharged the accused.
