BELGIAN DEFENSE BILL, NOW PASSED

Brussels, Belgium, June 30.—The Chamber of Deputies has passed the army reform bill by which general service takes the place of recruitment of only one son per family. According to the provisions of the new bill, the effective forces in time of peace will be 55,000 men, and in time of war 340,000—18,000 for the field army, and 160,000 reserved for the defense of strong places on the coast and the frontier. The bill also provides for the formation of a recruiting reserve force formed from the annual contingent and for the organization of reserve cadets. The bill was passed by 104 votes against 62, four deputies refraining from voting.

ANATOLE FRANCE AT ZOLA BANQUET

Paris, France, June 30.—Anatole France delivered a speech at the Emile Zola Society which was received with great applause by the large attendance. After paying a tribute to Zola, the champion of justice, to Mme. Zola and to those who by their presence that evening showed their faithfulness to the ideals for which the society stood, M. France said that the enemies of justice and truth were always easy to recognize. They were always the promoters of hatred and disorders, the sowers of panic, the agents who provoked to agitation, the traitors of our country, the conquest of the whole human race. BRITISH TRADE GAINS ONE FOURTH IN FIVE YEARS

London, June 30.—Board of trade statistics show that during 1912 the value of the nation's exports was \$744,840,631 and the value of the imports \$487,223,439. In 1911 the value of the exports was \$680,157,527 and the value of the imports \$454,119,298, while in 1910 the value of imports and exports was \$678,257,024 and \$430,384,772 respectively.

In 1910 exports of foreign and colonial merchandise amounted to \$103,761,045; in 1911 the value was \$102,750,134; while last year the value was \$111,737,691.

Since 1908 the value of British imports has increased 25 per cent, or by \$142,000,000 and during the same period exports have increased by \$110,000,000 or almost 30 per cent. Imports from foreign countries have increased by \$94,000,000 and exports by \$60,000,000. As regards the colonies, exports to Great Britain have increased by \$38,000,000 while exports from the home country to the colonies show an increase of \$51,000,000.

GREAT CONFERENCE ON WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC

Most Representative Gathering Ever Held Meet to Consider a Much Vexed Problem

London, June 30.—The annual congress conducted by the International Bureau for the Suppression of the White Slave Traffic assembled here today, and was formally opened with an address by the Lord Mayor of London. The gathering is the most representative of its kind ever held. Nearly all of the prominent nations have manifested their interest in the movement by sending delegates to the congress. The United States has sent a score of delegates and Canada is represented by a delegation of a dozen members. The sessions will continue through the greater part of the week, and will be devoted to the consideration of plans to bring about uniform and stringent laws in all countries for the suppression of the traffic in girls. Later in the week the delegates are to be received at Windsor by their Majesties, King George and Queen Mary.

MICHIGAN HONORS "ZACH" CHANDLER

Washington, D.C., June 30.—In commemoration of his great services to his state and country, a statue of Zachariah Chandler, twice senator from Michigan, and secretary of the interior under President Grant, was unveiled in Statuary Hall, in the Capitol. Lewis Cass, general in the War of 1812, governor of Michigan territory, secretary of war under Van Buren, and minister to France and secretary of state under Buchanan, is the other citizen who has been honored by the state of Michigan in the same manner.

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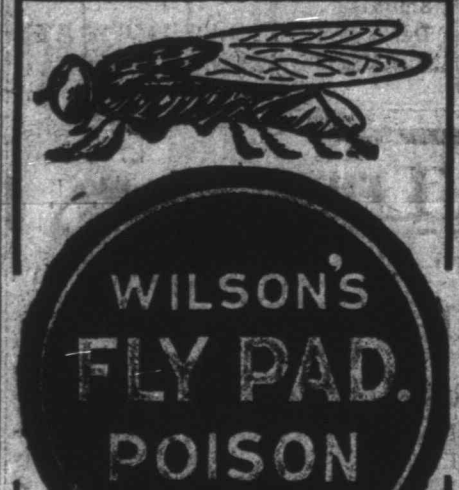
CATHOLIC SUMMER SCHOOL OPENS

Peru, Ind., June 30.—"Uncle Ben" Wallace, reputed to be the wealthiest circus man in the world, forever quit the show today, when his controlling interest in the Hagenbeck-Wallace shows was transferred to a newly formed corporation known as the United States Amusement Company. Wallace entered the circus business more than a quarter of a century ago, and has been on the road every season since without intermission. His home and the winter quarters of his circus are in Peru. The veteran showman is said to be the only man who successfully bucked the "circus trust." The corpora-

tion which takes over the Wallace show is composed of capitalists in Chicago, Kansas City, Indianapolis and Davenport, Ia. At the head of the corporation is John O. Talbott, formerly a newsboy in Indianapolis and now a millionaire.
