FOODSTUFFS FROM STATES TO FINLAND

Washington, Dec. 23.—Steady pro-
gress in the establishment of a pop-
ular government in Finland on a
comparatively stable basis free from
German control has resulted in a de-
cision by the Allies to furnish that
country at once with foodstuffs for
civilian relief.
Shipment of 28,000,000 pounds of
foodstuffs to Finland has been au-
thorized by the United States War
Trade Board, with the approval of
the Allied governments.

DECREASE IN COAL EXPORTS

Commission of Conservation Book-
let Deals With Some Phases of
the Fuel Situation—Situation in
Coal Trade Changing.

How the situation in the coal trade
is changing, increasing the consump-
tion within the province of products
of Vancouver Island collieries, and
decreasing the export trade done is
shown in a report on the Fuels of
Western Canada issued by the Com-
mission of Conservation. It is pre-
pared by the Deputy Head, James
White, and is based largely on work
of the geological survey, and the in-
vestigation into water powers con-
ducted by Arthur V. White, Consult-
ing Engineer of the Commission.

Mr. White read a paper at the
second professional meeting of the
Engineering Institute at Saskatoon
in August, but the material in the
bulletin is revised to December 2.
The report reached Victoria last
week.

The contrast is told in percentages
as follows: Export to United States,
1917, from Vancouver Island and
Nicola Collieries, 32.6 per cent.; to
other countries 2.4 per cent, and sold
65 per cent, for consumption in Can-
ada. In 1902 75 per cent, was ex-
ported to the United States.

The majority of British Colum-
bians do not realize that Alberta
raises nearly twice as much coal to
the surface as the three main coal
fields of this province, namely 4,
738,368 tons last year compared with
2,433,888 tons in British Columbia.
In other words Alberta supplies one-
third of the coal raised in Canada,
and British Columbia less than 20
per cent.

Mr. White shows from the investi-
gation into water powers that heat-
ing by electric energy would on av-
erage prices be four times as costly
as with coal. He points out that heat-
ing by "white fuel" is only economi-
cally possible where energy can be
generated at a very low cost.

Examining the wood fuel situa-
tion he shows that the Forest Pro-
ducts Laboratory at Montreal has de-
termined that a cord of birch has the
same heating value as a ton of an-
thraxite, and that 1.20 cords of Doug-
las fir, 1.60 of hemlock and 2.10 of
cedar will give the same heating re-
sults. This is with coal possessing
a high calorific value, but Mr. White
anticipates the average coal would
give a lower equivalent to wood val-
ues, up to one-fifth of the figures
stated.



FROM PRIVATE TO C. O.—Alfred

Montreal, Dec. 23.—His Honor
Judge Duncan B. McTavish, senior
Judge of the County of Carleton, died
this morning after a brief illness. He
was 68 years old. Judge McTavish
came prominently before the public
eye in Canada in 1906, when he pre-
sided over the commission, which en-
quired into the life insurance situa-
tion in the Dominion.

BELGIAN CAVALRY HAS ENTERED GERMANY

Paris, Dec. 23.—The first cavalry
brigade of Belgian troops have en-
tered Germany, having reached Dan-
dorf. This announcement is made
by the Belgian War Department.

TWO FRENCH MISSIONS

New York, Dec. 24.—Two delega-
tions of Frenchmen arrived here to-
day aboard the transport France from
Paris. One of these consisting of 14
members was bound to Washington,
the other, consisting of 13 members
is headed for Siberia. The nature of
their mission was not disclosed.

SWEDEN WILL NOT SEND AN ARMY

Copenhagen, Dec. 23.—The Swed-
ish consul at Reval, capital of Es-
thonia, arrived at Stockholm today to
ask assistance from the Swedish gov-
ernment against the invasion of Es-
thonia by Bolshevik troops. The
Swedish Foreign Minister told the
consul that the government would
never permit the sending of a Swed-
ish army out of the country.
The consul now is seeking aid from
the British Legation at Stockholm.
