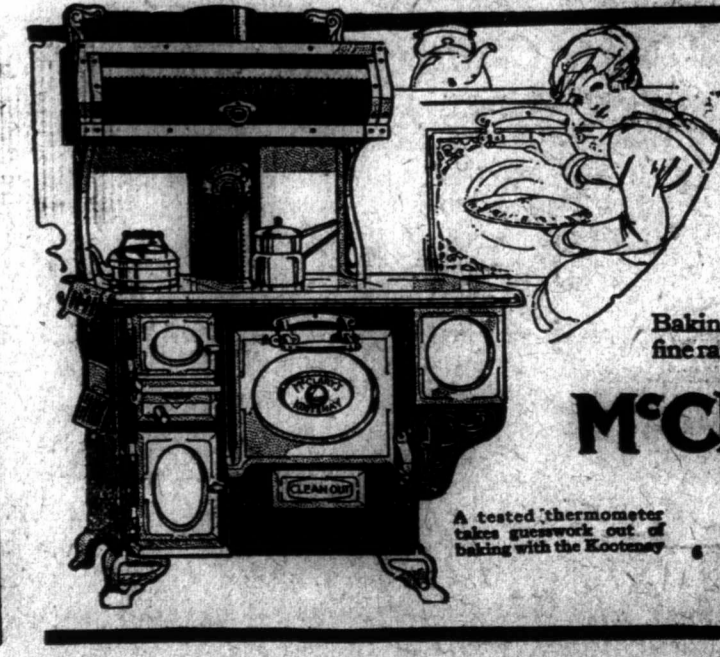
WERE NOT CHARGED FOR RENT OF TRENCHES Paris, Sept. 8.—Colonel Blanton Winship, Judge Advocate General and also head of the requisitions and claims department of the American Expeditionary Forces, finally disposed of the old story that the French people claimed rentals for ground occupied by trenches at the front in his testimony today before the committee of the American Congress investigating war expenditures. He testified that no such claim had ever been made against the American Expeditionary Forces and that the only claims of this nature were for the use of ground in the training area.

ALLIES KEEP ORDER IN UPPER SILESIA London, Sept. 9.—Upper Silesia, where serious conflicts are in progress between the Polish and German elements in anticipation of the proposed plebiscite over the transfer of the territory to Poland, will be occupied in the near future by allied troops, according to a statement made by General DuPont, it was learned today on semi-official authority. General Malcolm, representing Great Britain; General DuPont, France; General Kenczenga, Italy; and Colonel Goodyear, the United States, after visiting the camps in the region, are declared to have telegraphed to Paris urging the necessity of this action.
