HONORS OF FISHING FLEET RACE WON BY AMERICAN

American Boat Esperanto Proved Too Speedy for Her Canadian Rival, and Crossed the Finishing Line Eighteen Minutes and 28 Seconds Ahead of Canadian Boat—Boats Will Race Again on Monday—No Time Allowance—Best Boat to Win.

Halifax, Oct. 30.—The American schooner Esperanto today won the first race in the international fishermen's regatta off Halifax Harbor. She will meet the Canadian contender Delawanna, again Monday in another contest, which, if she is victorious for the second time, will give her the championship.

The race today was over a course approximately forty miles in length and was a dead heat, with no time allowance, the first boat that crossed the line winning.

Making up half a minute she lost at the start, the sturdy New England fishing schooner breezed along into the lead within the first ten miles and when half the distance had been covered, appeared a sure winner. The Yankee craft when she headed into Halifax Harbor for the finish line, was twenty minutes ahead of her rival, and made for the Nova Scotia port like a horse for his own stable.

Esperanto crossed the finish line eighteen minutes and twenty-eight seconds ahead of her rival by official time.

Spokane, Oct. 30.—Retailer dispensary will not be held responsible for older with a kick, according to official information from the Internal Revenue Bureau received here today. Instead of the responsibility for keeping the alcoholic contents below one-half of one per cent, to rest with the manufacturer, the ruling says. Retailers here are also warned not to sell hair tonics, toilet waters, or perfumes in large quantities or under suspicious circumstances, to persons with perfumed breath which are to be regarded as suspicious, it was said.

U. S. ELECTIONS NEXT TUESDAY

New York, Oct. 30.—The national and state elections to be held next Tuesday, Nov. 2, will be notable for the number of women nominees and the large number of parties which have nominated candidates.

Six parties have national tickets for President and Vice-President, and many more for the states. These tickets are Republican, Democratic, Socialist, Prohibition, Farmer-Labor and Single Tax. About 13 other parties have candidates either for state tickets or for representatives in Congress, bringing the total of all parties in the field nearly to a score.

In the Presidential election there will be chosen 531 members of the Electoral College of which 266 will be necessary to the election of a candidate as President. In the last election President Wilson had 277.

The present membership of the United States Senate is 96, composed of 47 Democrats, 48 Republicans and one Republican and Progressive. This year 33 states are to elect 34 senators, the terms of 32 members of that body expiring on March 3, 1921, while the other two are being selected to fill unexpired terms up to March 4, 1925. Of the 32 senators whose terms expire next March, 17 are Democrats and 15 Republicans.

The two additional vacancies were caused by the deaths of Senators Bankhead of Alabama and Martin of Virginia, both Democrats. One senator is to be chosen in each of the 33 states except in Alabama, which elects two.

The only states which do not elect senators are Delaware, Maine, Massachusetts, Mississippi, Minnesota, Michigan, Montana, Nebraska, New Jersey, New Mexico, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Texas, West Virginia and Wyoming.

Women candidates for the Senate have been nominated in six states, by the Prohibitionists in Indiana, New York and Pennsylvania; by Socialists in California, by the Farmer-Labor Party in New York and Connecticut and by Independents in Nevada.

Socialists have candidates for the Senate in 11 states: Alabama (2), California, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, New Hampshire, New York, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, and Washington. The Farmer-Labor Party has senatorial candidates in seven states: Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Missouri, New York, and Washington.

At least eight other parties have nominated candidates for Labor, Single Tax, Independent, Industrial Labor, Labor, Independent Republican and non-Partisan League.

The total membership, 435 of the next House of Representatives is to be elected. Of this number 218 is necessary for a majority. The present membership is Democrats, 190; Republicans, 232; Independent Republicans, 2; vacancies, 9. Women have been nominated as candidates for representatives in at least 11 states including Alabama, California, Idaho, Iowa, Michigan, Nebraska, Massachusetts, New York, Oklahoma, Oregon and Missouri.

MEIGHEN AND CALDER ADDRESS MEETINGS IN VICTORIA

While Hon. Calder Was Speaking the Heckling Became so Boisterous as to Call Forth the Remark from the Speaker That if it Continued, He Would Ask the Chairman to Close the Meeting—Meighen Denounces Utterances of Mackenzie King as Without Foundation.

Victoria, Oct. 30.—Two meetings were addressed in Victoria tonight by Premier Meighen and Hon. J. A. Calder. In the main, the Premier dwelt on the charges made against the Government by the Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, when he spoke in Victoria. He spoke at length on the tariff, the Soldiers' Settlement Scheme, Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, the National House Building program, and the sugar question. Major Redmond, M.P., for Calgary, spoke on the soldiers' problems.

Numerous interruptions, questions and comments were shouted at the speakers at various times. Major Redmond had an especially hard time making himself heard, but persevered good humoredly.

So serious became the disturbance when the Hon. Mr. Calder was speaking, that he said he would ask the chairman, Mayor R. J. Porter, to close the meeting if it were continued.

"Do you want it to be said that some thirty persons so conducted themselves as to stop this meeting?" he asked. Heckling thereafter was of a minor nature.

Premier Meighen characterized Hon. Mackenzie King's charge that the Government was autocratic, as without foundation. "No man in Canada," he asserted, "can deny Parliament. No move had been made by the Government without Parliament's consent. The King wants the Government to obey the behests of the majority, and not the behests of the minority," he stated.

MORE DEATHS THAN BIRTHS

Paris, Oct. 30.—France's efforts to raise the birthrate and lower the death rate, by means of the new Ministry of Hygiene, are too recent to be judged by comprehensive statistics. The importance of the problem, however, is given pessimistic prominence anew by publication of the Labor Ministry's statistics for 1919.

There were three deaths to two births last year. In only one department, Finistere, did births exceed deaths. In a number of deaths were double and even nearly treble the number of births.

These advertisements were supplemented by several editorials and news articles on the rising cost of paper and on the methods of paper-making."

"The publicity was well planned and complete. It created immediate attention, as a matter of news. Indirectly, it was used to remind the public of the immense circulation of the Mail and Mirror which are now selling more than a million copies a day each."
