THE MANITOBA REPLY

Says That Sir Wilfrid Laurier is Under the Influence of the Papal Delegate.

The Premier's Parliamentary Statements Not Truthful—Wants an Appeal to the People.

A SERIOUSLY INTERESTING SITUATION.

WINNIPEG, April 8.—Discussing Sir Wilfrid Laurier's statement in the House on Thursday night, Mr. Rogers challenges any person to prove him guilty of one single inaccurate statement. He is also wrathful with Hon. Sydney Fisher, whom he characterizes as a pin head politician. He says: "In my generosity I have treated all inaccuracies of Sir Wilfrid as being due to his lack of memory. For example, I see that Sir Wilfrid repeated his first statement and based his whole case last night upon the fact that Manitoba has made no demands for extension of boundaries since he came into power in 1896 until 1905. This statement is absolutely incorrect, and it is only necessary to turn to the journals of the House for 1901 to prove that there will be found evidence of a demand made by a unanimous Legislature upon the Dominion, of which Sir Wilfrid Laurier was then as he is now the head, for an extension of our boundaries."

Sir Wilfrid goes on to say that there is something wrong with my statement, because I was not present at the interview with Mr. Sharette. I never said I was. He further states that it was a friendly interview between Mr. Sharette and Mr. Campbell, who met upon a former occasion. This is another inaccurate statement. Mr. Campbell denies ever having met Mr. Sharette before.

These statements explode the remarks made by Sir Wilfrid. There is

one thing however for which I will not stand, and that is the reference made by a pin head like Fisher to me, as making a false statement. I challenge Fisher or any person else to put their finger upon one single solitary syllable of any statement that I have made that they can prove to be false. "The Free Press undertakes to deal with me under the head of 'Manitoba's Shame.' Is it a shame to make known the treatment which this province is receiving at the hands of the Dominion, and the reasons why we are being so treated, then I am guilty. If the Free Press or those for whom they assume to speak think that I do not represent Manitoba, or that I am guilty of wrong in making public that we are prevented from getting our rights, then let them use their influence with the Lieut. Governor to dissolve the House, and let the people declare whether they want legislation drafted and moulded by Sir Wilfrid's boss from Rome."

"The facts brought out go to show that we have a Papal Delegate in the Dominion on the invitation of men who represent themselves as members of Parliament and as representatives of the Liberal party, and they should assume responsibility for his actions. The simple mission of this Delegate with all the weight which must attach to his important office, acting under the cloak of religious influence, has been to assist Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his supporters on political matters."

COLONEL DRURY TO COMMAND AT HALIFAX

Col. Buchan at Quebec, Col. Gordon for Eastern Ontario—Other Appointments.

OTTAWA, April 8.—Some of the appointments in connection with the scheme of military re-organization in Canada have been decided upon. Colonel Buchan will go from Kingston to take charge of the Province of Quebec military division, with headquarters at Montreal. Lieut.-Colonel Gordon of Montreal will have charge of the Eastern Ontario division, with headquarters at Kingston.

Colonel Otter will have charge of the Western Ontario division, with Toronto as his headquarters.

Colonel Drury, the new Inspector General, will be appointed to command at Halifax.

Lieut.-Colonel Wilson will get command of the Canadian Field and Garrison Artillery.

CANADIAN PACIFIC AT 153 1-2.

Mackay Common Springs Into Activity and Strength at 43.

Traction Issues Show Little Change for the Most Part.

Lake of the Woods Common Quiet at 119.

MONTREAL, April 8.—The stock market was irregular today with Canadian Pacific easier at 154 to 154 1/2 compared with 153 1/2 yesterday. Mackay Common sprang into activity and strength at 42 1/2 to 43. Traction issues, for the most part showed little change. Toledo being strong at 34 to 4 1/2. Dominion sold at 22 1/2 to 23 and Nova Scotia Steel at 65. Lake of the Woods Common was quiet at 119. Dominion Coal was quiet and slightly easier at 82.

FIRE AT ST. JOHN.

Narrow Escape of Macaulay Bros. Establishment This Morning.

ST. JOHN, April 8.—When Macaulay Bros. store on King Street was opened this morning fire was discovered among some goods in the back. A chemical engine extinguished with little trouble what, in a few minutes more, would have been a disastrous conflagration. The loss amounts to about \$400; fully insured.

CANADIAN SUCCEEDS DR. OSLER.

Dr. Lowellyn L. Barker, Formerly of Hamilton, Ontario,

Has Been Appointed Physician in Chief, Etc.

Of the John Hopkins University at Baltimore.

HAMILTON, April 8.—Dr. Lowellyn L. Barker, M. D., son of Rev. J. F. Barker, formerly pastor of Victoria Avenue Baptist church, has been appointed successor to Dr. Osler as Physician in Chief and Professor of Medicine at John Hopkins University, Baltimore, Md. Dr. Barker is 35 years of age. After graduating from Toronto University in 1890 he spent a year in the Toronto General Hospital and from there he went to Baltimore and spent several years in John Hopkins Hospital, in different positions. When the Chicago University was opened Dr. Barker received the appointment of Professor of Anatomy and last year he was appointed Professor of Medicine there. His work, The Nervous System, published in 1899 is the most complete work of the kind.

LOST HIS MILLIONS

And Ended His Life in the Alms House—Career of a Chicago Speculator.

CHICAGO, April 8.—Edward W. Mitchell, at one time a leading figure on the Chicago board of trade, organizer of a corner in wheat in 1898 and once worth millions, is dead at the County Hospital at 70 years, a pauper. His fall came in 1899, only two years after he had cornered the wheat market and made a fortune. Since then he has lived in hope that one day he would regain his fortune. But his failure had so effected him that he never regained his position. He grew poorer and poorer until in recent years he depended entirely upon the charity of his friends. Members of a board of trade have made up a subscription to help defray the funeral expenses.
