HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 23.—The most
sensational probate suit ever tried in
Nova Scotia is now in the courts. Two
years ago Alexander McLeod, wholesale
liquor dealer, and the wealthiest man in
Halifax, died, aged 80 years. He
was formerly a private in the celebrated
Black Watch Regiment, and began life in
Halifax penniless. He accumulated a
fortune and became miserly. He was
childless, and besides his aged wife, his
only other relative was a brother in Scot-
land, whom he had not seen for a great
many years. His wife had a niece whom,
it is alleged, McLeod frequently promised
to "provide for." When his will was
read it was found that after leaving cer-
tain amounts to his business partners, his
wife and \$500 a year to his brother, the
residue of his estate, estimated at \$200,000,
was left to Dalhousie College, an
institution in which he had never pre-
viously taken any special interest, while
the niece was not remembered at all.

The brother is now nominal plaintiff
in a suit to test the will aside on the ground
that McLeod was of unsound mind when
he made it. The allegation is that in-
terested parties got the old man to destroy
the first will leaving money to his niece,
and make another, when in his dotage,
by which the college was to get the re-
sidue, but out of which they made big
bucks before it came into the hands of the
authorities. Revelations of Halifax so-
cial and commercial life are promised at
the trial.

An eminent German physician recom-
mends for the extinguishment of fire in
closed places, where the use of water or
other liquids would be likely to do great
damages, a dry compound which, by its
burning, absorbs the oxygen and quickly
renders combustion impossible. The
compound is composed of powdered
nitrate of potash (saltpetre), fifty-nine
parts; powdered sulphur, 36 parts; pow-
dered charcoal, 4 parts; colcothar (brown-
red oxide of iron), 1 part. This prepara-
tion is one that can be cheaply made. It
is recommended that it shall be, when
thoroughly dried and mixed, put up in
tight pasteboard boxes holding about five
pounds each, with a quick fuse in the
side of the box protruding six inches
with an inch inside, to facilitate and
insure lighting it.

THERE'S BLOOD ON IT.

A doctor, with whom it was a settled
principle never to speak to a rum-seller,
was sent for to visit a saloon-keeper's
wife. He paid no attention to the sum-
mons, although it was three times repeat-
ed. The man sent word that his wife
was as much opposed to his business as
the doctor himself, and begged him to
come, assuring him he would keep out of
sight. The doctor went with alacrity,
and the patient was "on her feet again"
after two or three visits. The liquor-
seller waited long for his bill, but none
came. Then he sent for it repeatedly,
but with no result. One day as the doc-
tor was about to step into his "sulky" a
young man thrust a ten-dollar bill into
his hand, and explained that the liquor-
seller wished him to keep it all. "Such
a look of horror came into the doctor's
face," said the young man, "that, to this
day, I feel as though somebody was mur-
dering right there and I helped to do it."

"I can't touch it—there is blood on
it!" cried the doctor as he threw it away.
And yet he was in particular need of the
money just then for temperance work.
The young man said the doctor must have
been a mile away from he recovered
himself enough to search for the bill, and
when he found it he took it carefully be-
tween his thumb and finger unable to re-
sist the impression that it was dripping
with human blood. In little over a year
the liquor-seller closed his store forever.
Years after, as they lay under the stars
one night, the liquor dealer told the doc-
tor that from the day he sent that bill,
he never took in a piece of money, large
or small, that the words, "There's blood
on it!" did not ring in his ears.

In grown persons diseases of

NEURALGIA.

A very simple relief for neuralgia
is to hold a handful of linoleum in half
a pint of water, till the strength is
out of the herb, then strain off and
add a teaspoonful of fine salt.

Wring clothes out of the liquid as hot
as possible, and spread them over the
part affected. It acts like a
charm. Change the cloth as soon
as cold, till the pain is all gone;
then cover the place with soft, dry
covering till perspiration is over, so
as to prevent taking cold.

Take two large tablespoons of
cologne and two teaspoonsful of fine
salt; mix them together in a small
bottle; every time you have any
acute affection of the facial nerves
or neuralgia, simply breathe the fumes
into your nose from the bottle, and
you will be immediately relieved.

Prepare horse-radish by grating
and mixing with vinegar, the same
as for the table, and apply to the
face, or to the head and face is af-

handles of boxes, barrels and tools.
Then if he is blessed with a borrow-
ing neighbor, the sight of the name
may remind the borrower to return
the tool before he has worn it out.
At least there will be less danger of
his thinking he owns it because he
has forgotten how he came by it."

A machine for picking raspberries
has been invented by a citizen of
Yates, N. Y. It consists of a long
tray made of cloth fixed to a light
frame. The tray is carried from
bush to bush, and with a large hook
in one hand, the operator draws the
bush over the tray, while with the
other hand he strikes the bush light-
ly with a padded bat.

Cold water and plenty of it, properly
applied, with a fair amount of
soap or pearline, is the best thing to
clean a kitchen floor. The regula-
tion "boiler suds" is apt to make a
kitchen floor greasy.

Feather beds and pillows would
be very much fresher and lightened
if left out in a drenching rain
every spring; they should be ex-
posed to this sun and air on every
side until perfectly dry.

To preserve goods from moths, do
not use camphor in any form.—
Place a sheet of paper laid in fur boxes
and in closets are a better protection.
