A horse owned by John Menzies died yesterday from lock jaw. The animal was a very valuable and handsome one.

The fire department was called out yesterday afternoon for a slight blaze in Hickson mill. Very little damage was done.

The report that the bottom had dropped out of the lumber market is untrue. The New York market was never in better condition than at present.

Warren Guy, Minota and Israel met at North Sydney on Monday, and Warren Guy won in straight heats in 2:19; 2:19; 2:21, though not without a great struggle. Rock Farm Grace won the 2:35 class.

The St. John Globe says the people of Truro, Gloucester Co., are to banquet Hon. Mr. Blair at the latter end of October. Prominent men in Dominion and local affairs are to be invited. The affair will be non-political.

The Adams house, Chatham, which was destroyed by fire last winter, has been rebuilt. The new house, which has all modern improvements and conveniences, was built by Mr. James Troy of Newcastle. It is expected the hotel will be re-opened this week.

Barque Fedella (15), Durante, which was reported put into St. Michaels September 16, leaving, when on the passage from Newcastle for Marselles, is making eight inches hourly. The leak is to be repaired by divers without discharging cargo and the vessel is expected to proceed in a few days.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Miramichi Local Union of C. E. will be held at Loggieville, Oct. 16th. All members, senior and junior will be expected to attend in a report, on which an open conference will be held. The programme is an interesting one, and all the members are requested to attend. Some excellent music may be expected and there will be a chance for all to help make the meeting a success.

An accident occurred on the Indian town branch on Thursday last. The engine on this branch runs backwards from Indian town to Newcastle because a suitable turntable has not been built at Indian town. On the down trip, Thursday, an axle of the tender broke at Amos's siding and the engine was thrown off the track and upset. A boxcar full of also, but the rest of the train kept on the track. When the driver of the suburban discovered the other train he reversed the engine, so that when the two locomotives came together they were moving slowly. Nobody was seriously injured. The accident caused considerable delay to other trains and the express was several hours late reaching Newcastle.

The trial of Chas. Dewitt for manslaughter was begun before Judge Wilson at Fredericton, yesterday. J. H. Barry, Q. C., appeared for the prosecution, and O. S. Crockett for the defence. Dr. Vanwart was the first witness called, and testified the same as at the preliminary examination. Mr. Dewitt was giving evidence when the court took recess at 1 o'clock.

They will be away about three weeks. E. E. Adams and wife of Boston accompanied them.

The Miramichi Presbytery is in session to-day in the St. James' Sunday school building. Rev. W. C. Calder, of Loggieville, moderator. The chief matter before the presbytery is a request from the parishes of Blackville and Indian town to be separated from Millerton and Upper Derby and Chelmsford. They asked for a clergyman independent of them, and agreed to support one. A representative from Millerton replied, and said his church would agree to the separation. The representatives from Upper Derby and Chelmsford are being heard this afternoon. There were three visitors in attendance, Rev. Dr. McMillan of Halifax and Rev. Messrs. McLachlan and Hamilton.

Frank Sheagreen who died in Minesopolis last week was one of five brothers well known in Newcastle, each of whom furnishes an admirable object-lesson of the modern self-made man. The eldest brother, or Edward left Miramichi upwards of twenty years ago, and now occupies an important position in the Great Northern Railway at Minneapolis. James, formerly merchant clerk in the employ of J. W. Davidson, is a familiar and successful personage in New York amusement and newspaper circles. Joseph, who for many years was in the employ of Sutherland & Creighton, is now at the head of the Mercantile house of Sheagreen & Co. at Vancouver B. C., and David the youngest brother, at one time the trustee of the late Charles Sargeant. He removed to Minneapolis some six or seven years ago where he has taken up his permanent residence. He is a brother of the Sheagreen of the Government Fish-breeding Establishment at South Esk.

There is little actual war news to-day. The papers recapitulate the British and French military preparations. Neither the jingo nor the anti-war party are very proud of yesterday's affair on Trafalgar square, which proved nothing except that a mob is always "jingo."
