IMPORTANT POLITICAL DOCUMENT.
Rome, July 6.—An important political document reforming the organization and working of the Roman congregations was made public today. It removes Great Britain, Holland, Canada and the United States from the jurisdiction of the propaganda, these countries thus ceasing to be considered missionary lands.

Workmen Choose Candidates

Declare For The Inauguration of The Co-operative Commonwealth.

New York, July 4.—Candidates for president and vice-president of the United States were nominated, and a platform was adopted by the national convention of the Socialist Labor Party here yesterday. The ticket named is as follows: For president, Martin B. Preston, of Nevada.

For vice-president, Donald Munro, of Virginia.

The nomination of Preston for president was unanimous, and was received by delegates and audience with wild applause.

The platform is identical with the one adopted by the party four years ago, and declares for the substitution of the co-operative commonwealth for the present state of planless production, industrial war and social disorder.

Preston is in prison for having, while serving as a picket in a recent Goldfield strike, shot and killed in self-defence a saloonkeeper who had assaulted him with evident intent to commit murder.

The Socialist party, which in 1904 polled 400,000 votes as against only 34,000 for the Socialist Labor Party which has now nominated Preston, met at Chicago some time ago and re-nominated Eugene V. Debs. Some years ago, Debs was also in jail for his part in the great railway strike.

The platform and principles of the two Socialist parties are nearly identical.

W. C. T. U.

Quite a stir has been caused in the anti-alcoholic cause on the Continent of Europe by the action of M. Vandervelde, leader of the Socialist party in the Belgian parliament, in joining the Good Templars. Total abstinence has made slow progress and is still almost unknown in Belgium, but its open adoption by the leader of a large party in state politics will give it a strong impulse. At a time when the French Chamber of Deputies and the Swiss Federal Council are covering before the attacks of the liquor interests, it does one good to see that not all men of politics show the same weakness. It is to be hoped that under his leadership the Socialist party will identify itself with the war against alcohol, a most formidable obstacle to the emancipation of the working classes.

Bryan The Democratic Choice

Will For Third Time Lead Opposition to Republican Administration

Denver, Colo., July 10.—Wm. Jennings Bryan was at 3.40 o'clock this morning nominated by Democratic Convention for the Presidency. The nomination was made on the first and only ballot, the vote standing: William J. Bryan, 802; Judge George Gray, 504; Governor John A. Johnston, 50; scattering or voting, 8 total 1,366.

John W. Kern of Indiana was nominated for vice-president.

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
