Speaking of the return of the Culonial soldiers from South Africa the London Telegraph says: "These Caradian campaigners wore all sorts of trousers, vests and tunior, some of these being decidedly the werse for battle-wear. Many among their number limped along, hobbling with leg wounds yet unbealed. When that is the case a great exodus of troops must naturally take effect from South Africe, including all, or the larger portion of those magnificent forces which the colonies contributed to the war. We almost wish it were possible that England lay on the homeward path of every separate contingent, as she does on that of the Canadians, in order that we might see and welcome one and all in turn these builders and defenders of the Empire. But it is good to think that, whichever way their route lies, these bold and faithful children of the Queen, born beyond the seas, will return to their households, each of them the natural advocate of the federation of the British race.
