**ALEX BROADFOOT, SR.**  
 Clerk of a Huron Pioneer & Settler of  
 Tuckersmith Who Had Goderich for a  
 Mark.

The Goderich Examiner says:—The  
 announcement was made on Friday  
 morning last that Mr Alex Broadfoot,  
 son of Tuckersmith, had on the previous  
 evening departed this life. Although  
 his announcement was not altogether  
 unexpected, Mr Broadfoot having been  
 seriously ill for some days, it was re-  
 ceived by all with feelings of the pro-  
 foundest regret. Mr Broadfoot caught  
 a severe cold on a clear day, which set-  
 tled on his lungs, resulting in inflamma-  
 tion and pneumonia, and which soon  
 brought him a very strong constitution.  
 Mr Broadfoot had reached the great age  
 of 87 years, and was as smart, active  
 man, and able to attend to his business  
 until his illness. He had been posses-  
 sed of an unusually robust constitution, and  
 he used to say that although he had  
 done as much hard work as any man in  
 Tuckersmith, he had never been con-  
 fined to his house through illness for  
 even one day. He emigrated to this  
 country from Scotland in 1833, and  
 took up and settled on the farm on  
 which he continued to live until the time  
 of his death. He was one of the first  
 settlers in Tuckersmith south of the  
 Huron Road, and consequently he en-  
 dured all the hardships and privations  
 as well as enjoyed the triumphs of pion-  
 eer life. Nothing delighted him more  
 than to recount the exploits of the early  
 settlers of the township and he always  
 maintained that the happiest period of  
 his life was when clearing up his farm.  
 As an incident of the times he was wont  
 to relate his experience on the occasion  
 of one visit to Goderich, which was then  
 the only market for this district. He  
 went to Goderich with two yokes of  
 oxen and two loads of wheat, and desired  
 to get a barrel of salt and a few pounds  
 of sugar, but he could not sell the wheat  
 and the merchants of that day refused  
 to give salt or sugar in exchange for  
 wheat and Mr Broadfoot had to take his  
 wheat home again and borrowed money  
 enough from Mr Dark, who then kept  
 hotel there, to buy the salt, and he went  
 without the sugar. Mr Broadfoot was  
 the very soul of honor, and few men en-  
 joyed more fully the confidence and es-  
 teem of their fellow men. He was a  
 member of the Presbyterian church, and  
 an enthusiastic liberal in politics. He  
 was twice married, his first wife being a  
 sister of Mr James Carnochan, of  
 Tuckersmith, and his second wife, who  
 survives him, a daughter of the late  
 Robert McMillan, of Hullett. He leaves  
 a large family of grown up sons and  
 daughters, all of whom are settled in  
 life. The remains were interred in the  
 Harpurley cemetery, and the esteem in  
 which the deceased was held was abun-  
 dantly manifested by the large concourse  
 of people who attended the funeral, the  
 occasion being composed of about one  
 hundred vehicles. Mr John Broadfoot,  
 of the Mill Road, was the oldest brother  
 of the deceased and Mr James Broad-  
 foot, of the 2nd concession of Tuckers-  
 mith, the youngest.
