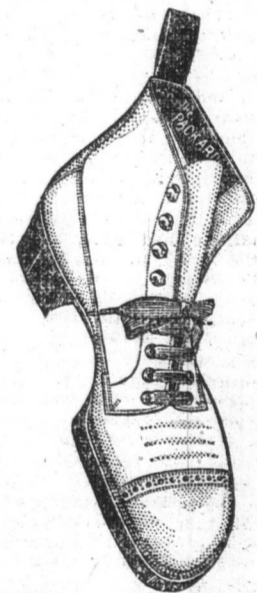

PRESTON VS. RED FYE

Mr. Richard Waugh, of the Free Press, in a letter to the Department of Agriculture of the Government of the Province of Ontario, asks the question of the relative merits of the two varieties of wheat, Preston and Red Fye. Mr. Waugh does not discuss the question but in his own department desires that every district in the west should have their opinions on the matter in order to determine the one to be planted. In an article in the Free Press of the 14th day ago, Mr. Waugh quotes the opinion of E. W. Fyfe, of the Farmers' Institute at Markham, who has won the prizes for good wheat crops in the province and advises the farmers of the province to plant Red Fye for a paying crop. In the above connection, Mr. Waugh asks the farmers everywhere: "Preston was greatly superior to Red Fye only a few years ago, but in the newer portions of the province and for that reason was taken up by the new comers. Do you trust the advice given the province grain growers. If not, then did of the climate and conditions I would myself have advised anyone to take up the Red Fye. The exclusions of the high government experts, Mr. Preston may have been in than any other variety. "There was another complaint for using Preston, it stood high on the government as a successful yielder, heavy cropping and high yield. If we can be certain that it is well founded, I am sure that Preston will ripen a day or two earlier than Red Fye.
