ADVERTISING THE CITY.

The American Waterworks Association holds its annual meeting next week in Milwaukee. Among the papers that will be read there is one prepared by A. Maclean, superintendent of the Edmonton waterworks system on Municipal Government, in Edmonton. Mr. Maclean was unable to attend the convention himself but forwarded his paper which will be placed before one of the largest engineering bodies in the world, and will do much to make known the success of Edmonton's municipal government.

He was greatly impressed by Edmonton, and thought it no wonder that its reputation as a city of "Promise and Performance" stood so high in the East. Mr. Downey left yesterday afternoon on the C.P.R. for Red Deer.

LACOMBE BULL SALE.

A most successful bull sale of Hereford, Holstein, Angus and Shorthorn stock was held in Lacombe on Wednesday, June 2nd. The attendance was about 300 from all Alberta points, and the sales were quite brisk and satisfactory.

About sixty bulls changed hands at prices ranging from \$150 to \$1800, three going at the latter figure. One of the chief buyers was C. Markle, Indian agent who bought twenty-five bulls in all. Some purchases were made by stockmen along the C.N.R. and from Inimfall, Crossfield, Carstairs, Aldrie and De Winton. The sale was held on the exhibition grounds and was conducted by S. W. Paisley. A feature of the sale was that the Herefords did not sell as well as the Angus and Shorthorn. Immediately after the sale proper, Mr. Paisley officiated at a sale of pure bred Holstein cattle, which was also very successful, cows sold at high as \$130, yearlings and two year-olds \$70 to \$90, young bulls \$50 to \$80. There were two carloads of stock the joint property of W. J. Tegillus, of Calgary, and A. B. Blackwood, of De Winton.

TO RUN CARS ON FIRST STREET.

In the course of the next two weeks the operation of street cars on First street north to the C.N.R. station will be commenced. It is probable that the Strathcona cars, instead of running through to Namayo avenue, as at present, will be diverted up First street, as was contemplated several months ago. The new service will afford better service to the C.N.R. than is at present obtainable and will also put in use a portion of the line that has stood idle ever since its construction.

MORE CATTLE THEFTS.

Jack Dubois, who was last week sentenced to months imprisonment at Fort Saskatchewan in connection with the cattle stealing cases at Stettler last winter, will come up again at Stettler next week on two further charges of cattle rustling. The preliminary hearing will be before Inspector Wood who will go down south for the trials. A half-breed named La Roque, from Wetaskiwin, will come up at the same time on a charge of horse stealing.

BACK FROM PIGEON LAKE.

Frank Gray returned yesterday via Millet from Pigeon Lake, where he has been with City Engineer Laurinell and Government Sanitary Engineer Owens, looking into the sources of the proposed gravity water supply for Edmonton. Mr. Gray is more optimistic than the previous year; but judging from the architect and builders' reports the outlook appears most promising for this year. BREACH OF CITY BY-LAW.

An information has been laid by the medical health officer, Dr. Whitelaw, against J. Gainer & Co., charging them with a breach of the city by-law in keeping a pig ranch within 25 feet of a public highway on the Great hearing on Monday. The defendants contend that they are not maintaining a nuisance. They say also that the property was bought for the purpose of keeping pigs, so it was near the railway line, and the criticism by nearby residents of the yards is not because of the fact that they are a nuisance, but because of factious opposition.

PARLIAMENT HILL PROPERTY.

The block of property from Saskatchewan avenue to the river and between Sixth and Ninth streets, the centre of which the Parliament buildings are being erected, has been partly acquired by the government. All ready about a dozen lots have been purchased at prices ranging from \$2,500 to \$3,000.

FIREMEN'S CONVENTION.

The firemen's convention to be held here during exhibition week will be much to make known the success of Edmonton's municipal government. All parts of Western Canada. Chief Davidson last night received a letter from the secretary, Chief E. G. Wiswell, of Brandon, who says the prospects are very bright for a big gathering. Eight companies manufacturing fire apparatus have intimated that they will make exhibits. These will be shown in the warehouses of the Great West Implement Co., while the sessions will be held in the city council chamber. Among those who will be present and read papers will be W. S. Bismach, of Winnipeg, and F. W. Birch, secretary of the Western Canada Fire Underwriters' association. The local authorities are particularly desirous of having the attendance of Mr. Birch as they are of the opinion that they can give him some pointers on the efficiency of western fire brigades.

TRAIN TIME CHANGE SUNDAY.

A brief railway services over the C.P.R. lines will be effected by the new time schedule which will come into operation on Sunday. On the C. & E. line, trains will leave Strathcona at 8.25 o'clock a.m. and 3 p.m. and will arrive in Calgary at 4.15 p.m. and 10.40 p.m. Trains will leave Calgary at 8 o'clock a.m. and 2 o'clock p.m. and will arrive in Strathcona at 4 p.m. and 9.40 p.m. For tourists and travellers going east and west of Calgary the change in the C.P.R. time out of that city will be important. West bound trains will leave Calgary at 3.25 a.m. and 5.45 p.m. and east bound trains at 2.30 a.m. and 1.30 p.m. As announced in the Bulletin a few days since the change in the C.N.R. time table shortening the trip will be in effect on June 13th. On the same date the Steamship Empress will be run from Winnipeg to Port Arthur to the docks of the Northern Navigation company. This is to accommodate those desiring of taking the late trip to eastern points.

The bishop was interviewed and spoke very emphatically on the subject. The greatest disgrace to the western provinces is the marriage of white men to Indian women. The Englishmen, as well as others who settled in these backward parts in a very early stage of our civilization, long winter and many sooner or later bound themselves by marriage to Indian women. The bishop said that while there was no news of the strikers, the town was at the mercy of the strikers.

Webster, Mr. C. M. Dowsett, Dr. Irving, Stewart, Auld, Cooper, Irwin, West Lubbock, Lyons, Knowles and the secretary. Mr. Cooper announced that 350 Indians, all decorated in war paint and feathers, including 100 braves on horseback, would attend the Edmonton exhibition this year. In addition to this unique attraction Mr. G. H. Webster, of the theatrical exchange, Valley City, Dakota, has forwarded the outline of a magnificent program of special attractions that will be put on by the theatrical exchange on the attractions platform.
