

A lighted lamp was left in precedents there may be for a House of Commons insisting on a settlement of grievances before granting supplies, there is none for the Ministers of the Crown refusing to ask for the means of raising money, because of the obnoxious conduct of a house of parliament. Such a proposition is the acme of absurdity. It is a course which has not even the saving grace of effectiveness. It would cripple the Crown and leave the House of Lords untouched and smiling at the blunder. With-holding authority to the Crown to raise the annual revenue to run the army, navy and public services is a blow at the Crown and not at the House of Lords. Such a course would not injure the House of Lords directly, but it would injure the Crown and the services on which the independence of the Empire depends.

It would be absurd for the Asquith Minsitry to starve themselves to death financially at the door of the House of Lords. It might prove a pathetic spectacle. but they would not make good, and should they do it they would deserve impeachment rather than praise. Asquith however, has won out, because he was pursuing a common sense course. He has evidently compromised with his dissentient followers by promising to take up the relationship of the Houses in the matter of relative powers, and by relegating the composition of the membership of the House of Lords to another ses-

his acquaintances. He is a most in dustrious man.


