Welsh Disestablishment.

London, April 29.—The Welsh disestablishment bill, which has passed its first reading, is not so drastic after all. It abolishes the connection between church and state, and nullifies the ecclesiastical law in Wales, but differing from the French law, it leaves the cathedrals, churches, episcopal palaces and parsonages to the church, with all their money endowments since 1662, which have an income of \$95,000 a year, and also \$200,000 a year from the ecclesiastical commissioners and Queen Anne's bounty. The total revenue to be administered by the parish, county or national councils of the amount taken from the church is \$905,000 a year. Incidentally the bill helps the reform of the House of Lords by unseating four spiritual peers.
