Yesterday's Accident.

Two Seamen Knocked Overboard — Their Lives Endangered.

At two o'clock yesterday afternoon Kenneth McDonald and Edward Furlong, two seamen of the S. S. City of Sydney, which was lying at Harvey's wharf, met with an accident which nearly cost them their lives.

Both men had been engaged painting the exterior of the vessel and in doing so were standing on a scaffold which comprised a piece of heavy planking made fast with ropes slung over the ship's side. Suddenly the ropes, not being properly secured, slipped out of the fastenings and the workmen were precipitated into the water. The piece of timber also gave way and in its descent struck McDonald on the head; it was a violent blow and knocked him insensible. He would have sunk immediately and drowned but for Furlong, who proving himself a good swimmer gripped his companion underneath the arms and held his head above the surface of the water until assistance came. Meanwhile the labourers on the wharf had procured ropes and a life buoy with which they rescued the seamen. After being brought to terra firma McDonald was still unconscious from the blow he got, while his shipmate appeared as if nothing had happened. The former showed symptoms of weakness as he lost a considerable amount of blood. He was afterwards removed to the cabin of the steamer and medical attendance given him by Dr. Cowperthwaite, who had to insert three stitches in McDonald's head to close the cut that was inflicted.

Quite a number of round-trippers who were standing on the deck of the ship were eye-witnesses of the accident, and the general impression was that a fatality would have happened but for Furlong's quick assistance, his comrade while in the water.

Special Evening Telegram.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.
Complete arrangements to land 2,000 bluejackets and marines in Nicaragua within 10 days, to protect the lives and property and maintain railway communications from the American legation to Managua, have been made by the States' Navy Department.

NEW BRIGHTON, Pennsylvania,
August 20.
Trying to get a piece of meat off the kitchen table, a dog overturned the kitchen lamp, causing a fire, in which three children, named Taylor, were burned to death, their parents being burned severely.

HONG KONG, Aug. 20.
A desperate attack was made last night by a large body of pirates on the Island of Cheung Chow, part of the British colony of Hong Kong, used chiefly as a missionary sanitarium. They overpowered the small police force, killing a Hindu police sergeant and two policemen, and looting the houses of the inhabitants, who number 2,700.

TORONTO, Aug. 20.
The combined defalcations of Arthur Raymond, of the Elm Branch of the Bank of Toronto, and Roland Harris, assistant clearing house teller at the Main branch of the Standard Bank, approximate \$50,000. Most of the money went to bookmakers at Dufferin Park and the Woodbine. Raymond attempted suicide.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.
A cable from London announces the narrow escape of King George from an accident while motoring from Bolton Abbey in Yorkshire, to Abbeystead in Lancashire. An auto belonging to David Thornton, a merchant, turned the corner suddenly, and its chaffeur avoided collision only by running into a ditch, where the car upset. The King alighted, and on receiving assurance that no harm had been done, shook hands with Mr. Thornton, and proceeded on his journey.

HONG KONG, Aug. 21.
Several British torpedo boats despatched from this port, endeavoured to find and attack the pirates who, on Monday night, raided the British Island of Cheung Chow, where they killed three native policemen and looted many houses. Reports from southern provinces, stating there is much excitement concerning the execution of General Chang Cheu and General Feng Wei, who were members of Dr. Sun Yat Sen's party, said that people of the south consider that the only solution of the present crisis is the formation of separate southern and northern republics.

The Corsican At Liverpool.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 21.
The Corsican arrived this morning. The fore part was protected by collision bulkheads, otherwise no signs of damage were shown. The passengers say there was no panic. Two Cambridge students assert that a number of passengers were panic-stricken, that a hundred tons of ice fell on the decks, and that there was 18 feet of water in the hold last Sunday. Capt. Croke asserts that the Corsican did not ship any water. He was presented by the passengers with a watch and a purse of gold.
