On the Aisne.

The swift, brilliant and successful French thrust on the Aisne front come as a surprise, as disagree able to the Germans as pleasing to the Allies. It is not exactly a departure from the tactics pursued for so long by General Petain, for they include sudden offensives of this nature as one of Dept. of the Col. The explanation of this very capable commander's whole plan of campaign during the past summer is probably twofold. It has aimed at the conservation of the French forces at a time when a vigorous of fensive could not be expected to achieve results justifying the cost. But the premier successes won by Nivelle early in the campaign have made it possible to effect this purpose and at the same time the complementary one of exhausting the enemy Certain positions then gained, no tably at this point on the Aisne and at Verdun, have imposed upon the Germans the necessity of continually attacking them as the best, indeed the only, means of preventing the French from making further encroachments It will be noticed that on the French front it is the Crown Prince that has done most of the attacking for a long time, which means that his losses have been much the greater. In fact, it will prove in the end that the part the French have played in the campaign of 1917, while it has left the big offensive programme to the British, has contributed very greatly towards that exhaustion of the enemy which is the only way to victory. This last thrust has been made directly in a line from Soissons to Laon, starting from Laffaux and extending to Chavignon. At the last named village the French front is close to the Aisne canal and looks down upon the level ground that extends to Laon. The gain of ground will greatly strengthen the French hold upon the important Chemin des Dames, but more valuable is the big haul of prisoners and the very large quantity of guns and material taken. As te-unable to be at home more than one gards wines, no person can obtain more than 24 ounces on any prescription, nor more than one prescrip tion per week; while no medical practitioner can prescribe more than five gallons (and a slight margin) per month. With beers and ales prescriptions are limited to one dozen pint bottles per fortnight. The most important provisions of course concern portant provisions, of course, concern the remaining intoxicants, whiskey, the remaining intoxicants, whiskey, rum, gin, etc. As regards these, each applicant is limited to one prescription, not to exceed eight ounces, per week in districts supplied by licensed druggists and practitioners, elsewhere, twelve ounces. In these districts, doctors may prescribe no more than three and four and a half gallons representedly new month, with a slight respectively per month, with a slight addition in the discretion of the Conroller. Regular returns have to be made in respect of liquors used for manufacturing purposes. REDUCING THE BUST.

Probably the flat chested girl cannot conceive of anyone grumbling because one is overdeveloped through the bust, but here, too, plump sister can enlighten her as to this It is my opinion, and I know that many women share it, that a too large bosom is more of a beauty detect than a too small bosom.

What would you say, if I was t tell you to keep your bust tightly bandaged for a few weeks? Would you do so? I hope so, as this compression method is one of the newest ways of acquiring a small bosom. If you are interested I will tell you how the handaging should be done

The easiest and most usual way o bandaging the bust is to take a straight piece of cotton cloth and pass it across the back and underneath the arms, bringing the ends to gether over the breast. The cloth must be wide enough to cover the bosom completely. The two ends of the bandage may be held together by means of tiny safety pins, and it is also well to take in what slack exists on either side.

As you will find that this bandage has a wild desire to slip down over the waist, it would be a wise idea to pass a strip of surgical gauze over each shoulder, pinning the ends to the breast bandage with safety pins. This treatment is not quite so sim


ple as it seems, as it will be necessary in order to obtain satisfactory results, to tighten the bandage a trifle each day, although you are advised to remove the bandage about every two days, rest the breasts and adjust the bandage again after bathing.
