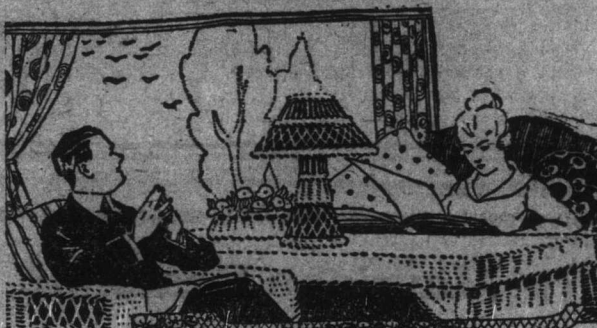

Intern Them All.

Strong Demonstration in Trafalgar-Square.

Only those who were in favour of the immediate internment of all alien enemy blood, whether naturalized or not, got any sympathy at the demonstration in Trafalgar-square on Saturday.

When Sir E. Pryce-Jones, M.P., said to the recent proposals of the Government would go a very long way to meet the demands, there were shouts of "No!" and cries of "We don't want to see 'em!" and "Get 'em out!"

give him a hearing. Wounded soldiers forcibly removed a man who showed himself a non-supporter of the meeting.

Mr. John Doherty, the chairman, said: "I expected every speaker would support the resolutions. If he will not, I cannot give him a hearing."

"I am a whole-bogger against them," said Mr. Owen Clark, Mayor of Bury St. Edmunds. "They are an accursed race. I owe the death of my brother to treachery, and by Heaven, I will never rest until I get even with them! Intern them all, or rather leave the 'n' out—intern them all. Let the name 'German' be handed down to posterity and be known to the historian as everything that was bestial, damnable, and abominable."

Falling in with his view, the audience repeated after him a solemn oath promising to bring force to bear on the authorities to "turn out the accursed, insidious, and dangerous enemy alien."

"Intern every one of the blighters, for there is no good German unless he is dead," said the Mayor of Canterbury.

Sir Alexander Benneman said that there is no use in internling only German bakers, hairdressers, and waiters. "We must begin at the top and work down." (Cheers.)

Major-General Sir Hugh MacMurtrei said "the two German Privy Councils ought to be interned for a start."
